sentation of this resolution and despite the motion to defer consideration of it until later, issued his statement as follows:

"I wish to record my vote with the chairman of the commission and say that in accepting the duties as commissioner I have given it all my time, and the past two months have been going over the system studying conditions and doing the best I could with the various problems presented in this resolution.

Always Starting Trouble, Complaint

"I have never attended a meeting of the commission since being on the board without the contending commissioner having a row or confusion as a part of his program, and during my entire term have never been able to secure a meeting of the commission in presenting this resolution.

"I have found that all former commissioners had done the same thing that I am trying to do; that they had put in much of their time and ability to construct a splendid organization, and I hope to deliver the same service and keep it as good as I found it."

A motion advocating that the highway commission set aside \$1,000,000 from its regular highway fund to take care of the matter of establishing the Fourth street-Washington county line stretch to connect with the West Side Pacific highway as a state highway came up before the commission. Spaulding proposed giving Portland \$350,000 to improve the Fourth street section within the city and pro rate the balance among upstate counties. Action on Spaulding's motion was deferred until Monday.

Says More Money Needed for Jobs

Spaulding asked Devers if he needed more money for unemployment. His answer was in the affirmative, adding that state action was necessary. The present fund, Devers said, would be expended by March 15, and after that some relief must be given. The commission is spending about \$10,000 a day on relief at the present, which is not sufficient, he said.

"Why not let some of the projects go and help the poor people who need food," Spaulding urged. "Our first duty is to the people, and we must give them relief."

He suggested that Devers prepare a complete report of what is needed and present it to the commission and the governor.

The commission during the afternoon approved the forest highway map on which 136 miles of forest highways were listed. The making of the map had been completed by the forest bureau after several years' work.

Asks Bonds All Be Sold in Oregon

Demand that the million-dollar bond issue, which the highway commission announced would be necessary to tide it over until automobile license funds came in, be sold to Oregon people so that interest money be retained in the state was made by Commissioner Spaulding of Chairman J. C. Ainsworth replied they had that opportunity, but a survey of banks in Oregon revealed it would be impossible to raise that much money here, or even raise 10 per cent of it. The chairman had announced that the commission would borrow the money for six months to carry on the work. It will be necessary to get the money in the east, he said.

Gain in Gasoline Tax Receipts is Shown in Report

Operation of the motor vehicle fuel tax law returned to the state of Oregon during the year 1931 a total of \$6,935,820.93, as against \$6,787,294.68 during the previous year, according to a report prepared by the secretary of state Friday. The tax was based on the sale of 170,239,112.27 gallons of gasoline and 3,493,160.8 gallons of distillate.

Refunds during the year 1931 totalled \$748,902.47, as compared with \$558,517.70 in 1930.

Non-resident registrations of automobiles in Oregon in January, 1932, aggregated 1814, the secretary of state reported.

Barney Dreyfuss Dies; is Father Of World Series

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Another of baseball's old guard, Barney Dreyfuss of the Pittsburgh Pirates, father of the world series, died today. He was the ninth nationally known figure in the game to die within 15 months and the second within two weeks. He would have been 67 years old on February 23.

He died in Mt. Sinai hospital, upon an operation for prostaticitis Jan. 6. The body was taken to Pittsburgh tonight. The funeral probably will take place Sunday or Monday at his home there.

as opposed to any cash payment on the adjusted bonus certificate. Sentiment throughout the country grew so fast for such payment that in January, 1931, the state delegates were called to Washington and there a test vote showed that the legion posts of the country were overwhelmingly in favor of a cash bonus settlement of 50 per cent. The executive committee of the national organization then reversed the stand taken at the 1930 convention and delegated its legislative committee to urge upon congress the 50 per cent settlement which subsequently carried.

Members of Capitol Post No. 9 yesterday expressed the view that similar action might result this winter. If so Oregon's delegates to the national committee will probably be instructed to vote for payment in full of the adjusted service certificate and if a sufficient national majority is rolled up, the national executive committee may reverse the national convention's action of 1931 and instruct its legislative committee to start lobbying before congress for full payment of the bonus certificate.

President Hoover appeared at Detroit in the fall and spoke against a cash payment of the bonus certificates.

The local committee which has drawn the resolutions to be presented Tuesday night is M. B. Hayden, Karl Steiner, George W. Averett, Bryan H. Conley, H. F. Field.

"I'll tell it to the public," Ainsworth replied. "Let's vote on the park site."

"Wait until I get through talking, and I have lots to say," "All right, go ahead," said Ainsworth as he leaned back in his chair and smiled.

The discussion went into consideration of other park sites when Spaulding again shouted "if any more parks are bought up I'm going to advocate to do away with the park engineer. I'm tired of having a man go around finding parks to buy. Parks should be gifts to the state."

When the disturbance had quieted, the commission had accepted the park at Eccla with Spaulding voting against. Spaulding, a resident of Salem, however, approved the purchase of the final part of the Sliker Creek Falls park site for a sum of \$5,000, making a total of \$32,000 paid for the park. But the commissioner added, "This park in Marion county was worth that."

At Shanghai showed the tenacity of the situation in the city is aggravated by Chinese refugees who are fleeing into the international settlement and by increasing unemployment. Cunningham estimated there were 162,000 unemployed.

At the war and navy departments plans were made for relief measures should the clash extend to the international settlement.

How to stop the clash at Shanghai becomes a more complicated problem every day. The fighting now extends from the international settlement northward 13 miles along the Whangpoo to Woosung, but the rearrangement of defense forces and the removal of the Japanese guards from American and British sectors have stopped sniping at Japanese which endangered the safety of the international settlement.

CHINESE NEW YEAR NOT GALA OCCASION

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Chinese new year began at sundown tonight, but the 15,000 or more residents of San Francisco's Chinatown observed it solemnly for there is war in the homeland.

It was agreed several days ago by the head men of the community there would be no general use of fireworks as in the past. Indoors there will be feasts but they will be devoid of the gaiety of other years, for much money has been sent home to China to feed sufferers and war victims this year.

The celebration lasts six days and is based on the anniversary of the birth of the Chinese republic twenty years ago.

School District Must Foreclose If Funds Needed

It is the duty of the Aurora school district board to proceed and foreclose on mortgages it may hold in case such action is necessary to protect the interests of the school district, Attorney General VanWinkle advised in an opinion handed down Friday.

The opinion was asked by Mrs. Mary Fulkerson, Marion county school superintendent.

The mortgages involve approximately \$23,000.

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OLD CIDER PLANT BEING TORN DOWN

Start of the razing of an old North Salem landmark yesterday signified the coming completion of the North Commercial street bridge project which has been held up since the fall of 1930 on account of right-of-way difficulties.

The city has purchased the old cider mill building and property at North Commercial and A streets and is paying wreckers \$75 for tearing down the structure, according to City Engineer Hugh Rogers. He says it will be at least a month before his crew can grade the property to complete the north approach to the bridge.

After the new bridge was finished in the fall of 1930, it was discovered the city did not own sufficient right-of-way for the approaches. In part, the delay since that time has been due to the necessity of waiting for the approach fills to settle.

For the past seven years, the old mill has been closed. The city purchased it from the Eena company.

to the League of Nations the right to dispose of heavy bombing planes of wide action and to place at the league's disposal batteries of long range artillery vessels carrying guns of more than eight inch calibre or 10,000 tons.

The French plan envisaged the prohibition of bombardments from aircraft or by artillery at more than (X) kilometers from the front line in land warfare and the prohibition of the use by aircraft or artillery of projectiles containing poison gases, bacteria or materials which are specifically incendiary.

Explaining his motives for introducing the French proposal when he did, Tardieu said:

"We are a people of good faith and wished to prove it today by an act. We refused to be deterred by those who counseled that it was not wise to go too quickly. The aim of what we have done today is to facilitate the work of the disarmament conference and we sincerely hope our efforts will be crowned with success."

"Our plan suggests measures to be applied to aviation, the newest arm of war and the most dangerous to civil population. It begins with internationalization of civil aviation. Subjects of signatory states will only be allowed to construct and use freely machines of non-military value and of tonnage below a figure to be fixed by the convention."
