UTILITY DISTRICT HEARING IS HELD

There was no active support or opposition at yesterday's hearing involving the proposed Tillamook people utility district, according to Charles E. Stricklin, secretary of the state hydro-electric commission, and B. L. Eddy of Roseburg, a member of the organization.

Stricklin said several speakers expressed themselves in favor of the utility district in case it was found to be economically feasible for the residents to develop and distribute their own power. These speakers were most interested, however, in learning what the engineering studies now being conducted by the commission will show, Stricklin said.

Although not actively opposed to the organization of a utility district, some of the speakers pointed out that a hydro-electric development utilizing the waters of the Trask river would seriously affect the lumber interests in Tillamook county.

A complete engineering report on the project will be ready in 60 days.

EXHIBIT FEATURES VOLUME BY EUWER

An interesting exhibit has just been on display showing a new volume of poems by an Oregon author, Anthony Euwer. The volume is entitled "The Friendly Fire" and much of it is beautiful and at times humorous sketches of Oregon and scenery of the West.

The picture was taken by Miss Gurnell on the first birthday of the youngster, and as the book is dedicated to "a little boy with blue-gray eyes who's sometimes good and sometimes bad and sometimes just between" the two connected interests of the author were displayed together.

Euwer, a poet, is also known in Salem as a painter of pastels. He exhibited a group of pictures here some time ago and there are originals of his in both the state and city libraries. There are also some of his pictures in Salem in personal collections.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—(Friday)—(AP)—The Sydney, Australia, correspondent of the Daily Mail said today he learned "on the highest authority" that Wing Commander Charles Kingsford-Smith, famous Australian flier, had been offered the post of commander-in-chief of the Chinese air force.

The aviator, who has flown both the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, declined to confirm the report. The correspondent said, however, he had quoted figures to China for a prospective purchase of his Australian airways fleet of planes.

As for his own services, he said he was jobless and would consider any offer. Friends said they thought that he might accept an advisory post in the Chinese air force, but that he was unlikely to engage in active service.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Members of the international commission enroute to the Orient to investigate the Manchurian situation, will leave here tomorrow aboard the Trans-Pacific liner President Coolidge. The party includes Major General Frank R. McCoy, United States army; the Earl of Lytton, former viceroy of India; General Henri Claudel, former inspector general of French colonies; Dr. Heinrich H. Schnee, former governor general of German colonies; and Count Luigi Aldrovandi Marescotti, of Italy.

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SOVIETS' POLICIES PRAISED BY GARLIN

laughed and applause to his sallies at the capitalist system and Hoover administration.

The reason that "recently so many people have become interested in the Soviet five-year plan," said Garlin, "is on account of the Hoover plan in the United States, the Laval plan in France, the Bruening plan in Germany and the Mussolini plan in Italy."

He held this interest due to "the decay of the capitalist system." Revolution here, he said, is inevitable. "The nations of the world have repeated the same mistakes over and over again and have put out 'provocations to embroil Russia in war,' averred the speaker. 'Since 1917, Russia which has sought no war on other countries has had to protect itself from the other countries. It is in defense of the U. S. S. R. 'The Soviet policy is clear, they do not want war because they are concerned with internal problems and construction.'"

No Unemployment In Russia Russia as "not a paradise or a Utopia, but a country of hard workers," Garlin presented a series of stereotypical pictures of the industrialized cities and communistic organized farms of Russia, from point to point, striking a comparison with the conditions of labor in the United States. "There is no unemployment in the Soviet union," he declared. "The coal miners there work six hours a day. A man in Washington recently told me American miners work better off—they do not work at all."

Garlin followed up his pictures taken in Russia with a series, which he termed the "Hoover plan," taken in the United States, showing laboring conditions on farm and in factory.

The new amendment would give the state authority to lease power sites and distribute all electric energy.

A section of the previous amendment permitting the appropriation and use of water for beneficial purposes was omitted in the proposed amendment filed Wednesday.

Any board or commission created, or empowered to administer the laws enacted to carry out the purposes of the proposed amendment, shall consist of three members who shall be elected without party affiliation or designation.

The completed petitions must be filed in the state department by July 8 in order that the amendment shall go on the ballot at the November election. A total of 17,038 signatures to the petitions must be obtained.

The original amendment has been abandoned by the grange.

February 24 has been set as the date for hearing the complaint of the Oregon City hospital and others against the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company.

The hearing involving accounting practices of Oregon public utilities in Oregon, will be resumed in Salem February 16.

ROSEBURG TO GIVE SOLDIER HOME SITE

ROSEBURG, Ore., Feb. 11.—(AP)—Mayor J. E. McClintock announced tonight the city of Roseburg is ready to transfer to the federal government the 40-acre site for the northwest soldiers' home to be built here at a cost of \$2,000,000.

The city late today reached a settlement with property owners for the final two tracts of land needed for the site and condemnation suits brought to acquire the property were dismissed.

Mayor McClintock said he understood the veterans' bureau plans to call for construction bids in March and that actual work on the home may be started before May 1. One million dollars already has been appropriated for the first unit and an equal amount has been authorized for additional construction.

It is expected here that one of the first buildings to be constructed will be a large hospital to relieve congestion in existing veterans' hospitals in the Pacific northwest.

He stated that Russia is enthusiastic about education and the majority of the people there are boosting and sacrificing that the five year plan may prove a success.

Laidler stated that the so-called drive against religion was more of a drive against superstitions than against religion.

He stated that many of the strict measures against freedom of expression, where it damaged the Soviet government, were necessary now, but will be relaxed later when the plan is better established.

Several remarks were made by Laidler concerning labor in general over Europe. The power of laborers, he maintained, has been a recent development in Europe.
