

Bearcats' Nose Out 38-33 Victory in Battle of Giants

LOGGERS AHEAD MOST OF GAME

Rieke and Carpenter Take Hand in Emergency to Save W. U. Laurels

Two big, fast, fighting basketball teams thundered up and down the Willamette gymnasium court without lasting advantage for either side until the last five minutes of Friday night's game. Then, by virtue of having capable reserves and throwing them into the game at the right time, Willamette gained a few points' margin over College of Puget Sound and managed to hold on to it to the end, winning 38 to 33.

On one occasion it was the appearance of Percy Carpenter on the floor that stopped an apparent walkway for Puget Sound. But at the final turning point in the game young Bud Rieke went in and shot the field goals that tucked the game away, after Jim Burdette, another reserve tossed into the fray in its final wild moments, had scored to put Willamette ahead for the last time.

Loggers' Fast Break
Puget Sound's dazzling fast break system baffled the Bearcats during part of the first half, and loss of both Willamette forwards on personals appeared to be a fatal blow later on. But these difficulties along with the enormous total of 23 personal fouls called on the home squad, were all finally surmounted.

Willamette led, 9 to 3, in the early minutes of the game, but once Puget Sound got the bounce, the lead changed sides, with everything the loggers threw at the basket going in.

Coach Roy Sandberg's men cut loose with one-handed overhead shots which couldn't miss their mark. The loggers led 16 to 11 and then 19 to 13. Percy Carpenter then entered the game and at once drew a foul and brought the count up. The score knotted at 19-all, but the loggers buried another shot in the basket to get a 21-to-19 half-time lead.

The ball was moved speedily about the court for the first half and fouls were numerous. The loggers maintained a tight defense which held the Bearcats at bay most of the time.

Puget Sound Takes Second Half Lead
The Washington men boosted their lead to 25 to 21 at the start of the second half, but just then Percy Carpenter steamed up and scored a couple of field goals. On one of the plays he thundered down the sidelines and sprang high in the air to spear the ball after running past and cut under the basket for a cradle.

Faber played a speedy game while in, but was the first to go out on fouls. Benjamin was the next Willamette player to succumb to the lure of the foul and such tactics, but meanwhile Gagnon and Command went out for College of Puget Sound.

The score once more knotted, at 28 this time, and Puget Sound again took the lead. Roy Benjamin tied the count shortly before going out and Jim Burdette, sub forward, brought Willamette to the lead at 32 to 30. McCoy converted a foul for the loggers and then Rieke put in another to put the game on ice.

The Bearcats used a semi-stall to maintain the lead during the last three minutes and to save themselves for tonight's struggle.

The Willamette freshmen meet the Linfield frosh at 7:15 in a preliminary game tonight.

Maple Leaving Today to Join Senator Squad

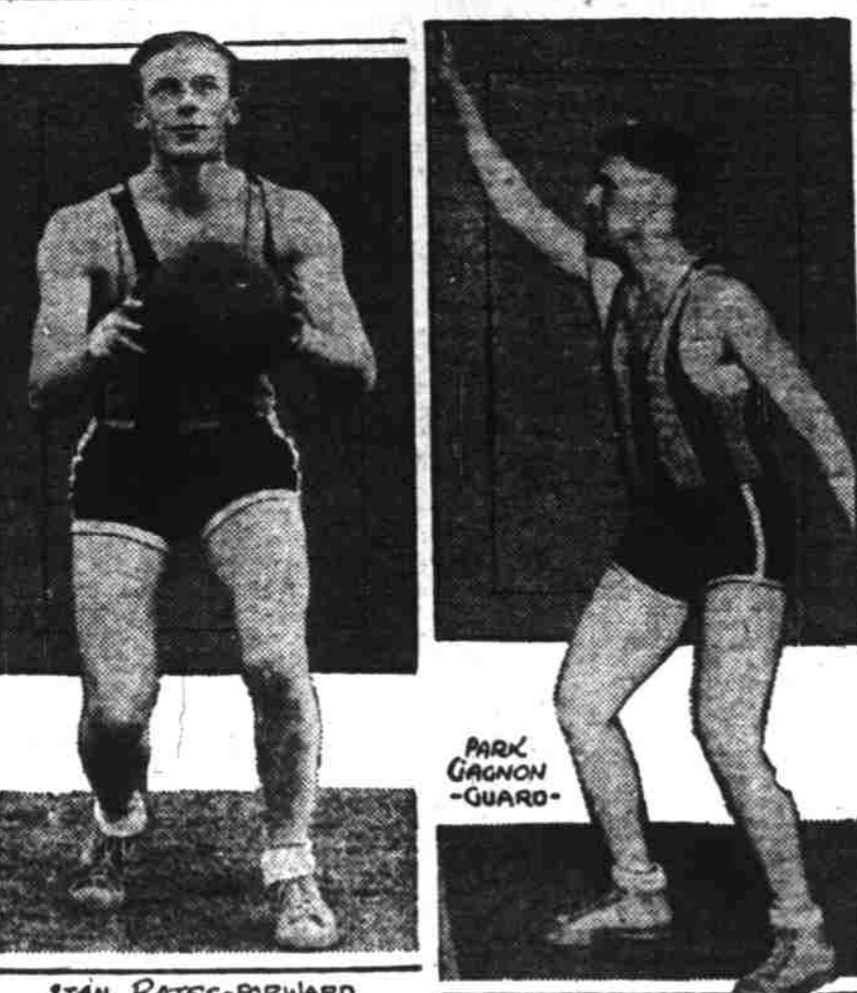
Howard Maple, assistant athletic coach at Willamette university, will leave this morning for Biloxi, Miss., where he will join the Washington baseball club of the American league.

CONGREGATIONALS DEFEAT BRETHERN

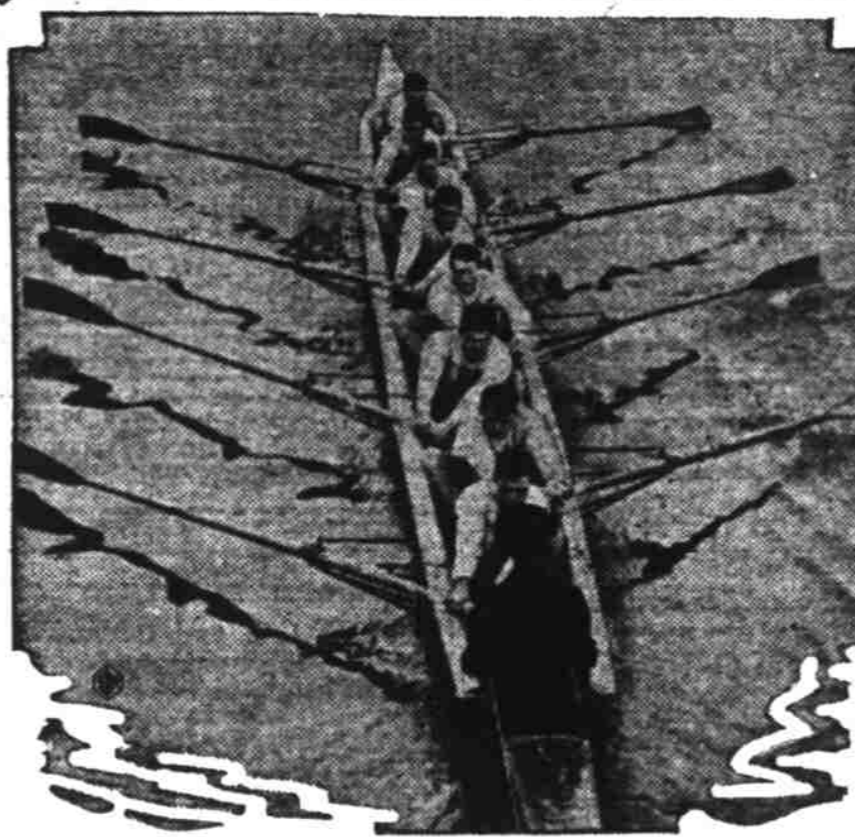

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 12—(AP)—The Washington State college Cougars faltered in their championship stride here tonight and dropped a Pacific Coast Conference basketball game to the University of Oregon. The score was 34 to 32.

Oregon led 19 to 11 at the half. Oregon is the only northern division team that has been able to overcome the Cougars this season.

Washington State rushed into the game and ran up a three point lead in the first two minutes of play. Then the Webfoots came to life and ran their score to 15 before the Cougars found the basket again. After that Oregon was never headed.

The Cougars gathered their forces in another thrust early in the second half and tied the score at 19 all but three field goals in rapid succession put the Webfoots well in front once more.

Oregon was leading, 33 to 26, with only five minutes left to play when Washington State again found the range and boosted its score to 32. Oregon scored a free throw just before the gun sounded.
