

SPAULDING OUT BUT UNBEATEN

Shows File of Letters to Prove Public Back of Economy Efforts

Governor Meier called by long distance telephone and asked if he would resign. The governor informed him that his retention as a member of the commission would cause him considerable embarrassment. I told Governor Meier that I would not resign, and I remain true to my word.

Governor Supported Every Move, Claim
Spaulding laughed heartily as he sat in the study of his home here last night and chatted with newspaper men. Several times during the conversation he read from a memorandum book, which recalled to his mind various conferences with Governor Meier. "Governor Meier supported my every move," Spaulding continued, "and never at any time did he ask me to alter or change my position on the question of economy in the highway department. As far as I know, Governor Meier was in accord with my demands, and repeatedly commended me for my activities."

Reports were current here last night that Spaulding was being urged to enter the contest for secretary of state at the republican primary election in opposition to Hal E. Hoss, incumbent. Spaulding would not comment on the reports. He made it clear, however, that he would not be a candidate for state treasurer.

Many Telephone Calls Received
Spaulding was deluged with telephone calls tonight, when reports reached Salem that he was to retire from the highway commission. The Salem chamber of commerce and numerous other local organizations previously had sent telegrams to Governor Meier urging that he be retained as a member of the commission.

One ray of sunshine in the controversy, Spaulding continued, "was the announcement that J. C. Alsworth and William Hanley also are no longer on the highway commission."

Spaulding said he was not personally acquainted either with Carl Washburn of Eugene or Ed Aldrich of Portland. He said that hundreds of letters and telegrams were received at the executive department Monday, endorsing various persons for the office of highway commissioner. The largest number of these letters and telegrams favored the appointment of A. C. Marsters, Roseburg banker, and Frank Jenkins, co-publisher of newspapers at Eugene, Roseburg, Medford and Klamath Falls.

Other endorsements mentioned the names of T. A. Livesley, Salem and Joe Roman, Astoria.

HOOD RIVER POWER DISTRICT PROPOSED

Preliminary petitions seeking to create a people's utilities district, to include the city of Hood River, and all of Hood River county, were filed in the offices of the state hydro-electric commission Monday.

The district is being sponsored by the Pomona grange of Hood River county. Signers of the petition include James R. Ford, J. D. Smullen, Edward Parker, T. F. Mason and Kenneth Harlan.

The cost of the project was estimated at approximately \$850,000. Water for power would be obtained from the west fork of Hood river with transmission lines extending a distance of 12 miles. A total of 2500 horse power would be developed. The proposed site of the power plant has not been determined definitely, according to the petitions.

The Hood River field is now served by the Pacific Power and Light company.

A law authorizing the creation of these utility power districts was enacted by the 1931 legislature.

JAPAN AGGRESSION SAID UNWARRANTED

Chinese Woman Outlines her Country's Attitude at Chamber Luncheon

Quite American in speech, in height, in dress and in everything except complexion and facial features, Mrs. Lillian Chin of Portland, a member of the Chinese Patriotic society of Portland, spoke in defense of the country of her ancestors before the chamber of commerce yesterday noon. She denounced Japan as an aggressor seeking to dominate China, and arraigned Japan for having started the troubles in Manchuria and Shanghai. She defended the boycott as legal, and as the only means of defense of the Chinese against the Japanese encroachments.

Manchuria, Mrs. Chin declared, was an integral part of China, with 97 per cent of its people Chinese. Japan by treaties had recognized the territorial integrity of China with special reference to Manchuria as part of China.

The trouble between China and Japan goes back to 1915 when Japan forced China to sign a treaty conceding the famous 21 demands. One of those extended Japanese authority over the South Manchurian railway, which Japan had acquired from Russia in 1905 and the lease of which expired in 1923. This treaty has been denounced as invalid because obtained under duress. Ever since then China has opposed Japanese advancement on the mainland.

Mrs. Chin asserted that evidence showed the Japanese had planned the coup of Sept. 18, that Chinese could not have torn up the tracks as the Japanese claim because a Japanese regiment guarded it.

In Shanghai, Japan struck the populous section of China in the night, after the mayor had acceded to the demands of the Japanese admiral.

"Upon what justice does Japan base such a wholesale slaughter of peaceful non-combatants?" she inquired. Such attack on civilians is contrary to international law even in time of war, she declared.

Mrs. Chin held out that the hope of China lay in the league of nations which might yet have China from becoming the subject country of Japan.

SHOP DEPARTMENT RECORDS COMPLETE

"Strict account of amounts spent on shop supplies, equipment and repair are being kept in this office for the first time this year," T. T. Mackenzie, director of vocational education in Salem public schools, reported to the school board last week. "As all remittances to the school clerk also pass through this office," he stated, "a definite check of gains or losses in any shop will be available for the first time."

Thirty-five odd jobs for the schools were done by students in the high school machine shop, of which C. A. Guderian is instructor. The classes have an enrollment of 18 beginners and 16 advanced students representing a student load of 99 clock hours. On account of crowded conditions in the shop, seven advanced students and two beginners have been apprenticed out in Salem industries.

In addition to instructing the senior and junior high school students in vocational subjects, the department has conducted evening classes of "Sewing for the Housewives." Another series of classes, in machine shop work, will be given for Salem craftsmen starting late this month.
