Whether the new commission is pledged to carry out the governor's wishes for Klein's removal was not stated.

Washburne, board member, said he would favor holding the commission's meetings here. The commissioners indicated they would receive bids for projects called for by the former commissioners and would probably carry on this work since there was lack of time for any changes in construction projects formerly agreed upon.
