TWO EXPERTS COME TO COOKING SCHOOL

Miss Amelia Sansom to be Here With Miss Brown For Safeway Event

In anticipation of having one of the largest cooking schools which the Safeway Stores Home-makers Bureau has conducted, the bureau has assigned to the Salem school two home economists, Miss Helen Elizabeth Brown and Miss Amelia Sansom. They will be here the three days of the school which will be held at the Salem armory on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Feb. 24, 25 and 26. The hours are from two to four p.m.

Joining with the Safeway bureau in presenting the school is a group of national food manufacturers and distributors, some of the very largest concerns in the country, whose products are handled in all food stores. The school is announced as an electric school with demonstrations of electric cookery.

The Statesman is co-operating in presenting the school as offering ladies of this community opportunity to receive the newest ideas on recipes, cooking, serving, menus, etc.

Each day's program will be different, one day being devoted to breakfast menus, another to the luncheon, and a third to the dinner. Table appointments will all be in keeping. Special attention will be given to economy in preparation of foods so the family budget may be given fair treatment.

Housewives will be given opportunity each day to meet the demonstrators and ask them questions on problems of cooking which they may have.
