COOKING SCHOOL TO OFFER SAVING PLAN

Budgeting, Wise Spending To be Featured Here At Armory Event

How to spend wisely, save wisely, budget a varying income, live comfortably and feed the family well are only a few of the important problems which will be taken up for Salem homemakers at The Statesman-Safeway Stores three day cooking school which begins February 24 and continues February 25, and 26 at the Salem armory.

Miss Helen Elizabeth Brown and Amelia Sansom of the Safeway Homemakers' bureau staff are of the opinion that in these times women are becoming more and more interested in the budgeting of food, clothing and other household expenses than ever before, and therefore she has included budget problems in her daily cooking school programs.

Because food is the largest single item of expense in most households Misses Brown and Sansom will place special emphasis on the food budget. They believe that this particular budget is a great deal more elastic than the majority of homemakers realize and that in many instances, food costs are kept considerably higher than necessary because the person in charge of handling the food supplies orders fancy groceries over the phone at the last minute.

One way of cutting down food costs, they suggest, is to keep a well-stocked, well-equipped kitchen. "There is really nothing that gives the homemaker a greater sense of confidence than plenty of supplies and a knowledge of how to use them interestingly." Another suggestion which they make to local housewives is that they take their market baskets and do their food shopping personally.
