DOG OWNERS NOW Dog owners are again notified that an act of the Legislature requires that all dogs over eight months old must be licensed before March 1st to avoid payment of the \$2 penalty for delinquency. A license on a male or spayed female dog is now \$2; after March 1st this must be increased to \$4.00. Until March 1 female dogs can be licensed for \$3.00; after that date the license fee must be increased to \$5.00. Dogs becoming eight months old after March 1st may be licensed without penalty at any time before they become eight months old.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL PLANT SITES EYED

Several sites deemed suitable for a municipal sewage disposal system will be reported upon next Monday night at the city council meeting, Alderman W. E. Daney stated yesterday. Daney with Henry Vandevort and V. E. Kuhn, comprises a committee charged with reporting prospective sites to the council.

The committee feels that the present time is an extremely favorable one for the purchase of such a site. Low prices of land will not prevail over a long period in the committee's opinion.

A total of \$10,000 has been set aside by the council for the purchase of the land which was authorized when a \$500,000 sewer bond issue was floated several years ago.

It is the plan of the council to acquire a sewage disposal site now with the view that river disposal of sewage will have to be abandoned within a few years. When this takes place, the lateral sewers will all run into the trunk line Church street sewer which in turn will empty into the sewage disposal plant constructed somewhere west of High street.

Nurse Will Aid In County Work Miss Edna Flanagan, demonstration nurse attached to the staff of the Oregon Tuberculosis association, arrived in Salem Tuesday and will spend several weeks here under the auspices of the Marion county public health association. Miss Flanagan will visit various communities of the county working with the county nurses and will arrange a number of public gatherings at which the importance of conserving public health will be emphasized.
