PALMBERG TOO GOOD AS SHOT

Makes all of Fishermen's Points in First Half; Score is 26 to 21

ASTORIA, Feb. 26.—(Special)—Coach John Warren's flashy basketball team defeated Salem high school, 26 to 21, here tonight, mainly through the points gained by PalMBERG, snake-armed forward for the Fishermen.

In the first half of the game Astoria scored 12 points while holding Salem to 8. PalMBERG made all 12 points for the Fishermen in this period and though the Corns out his scoring in the second period, he glommed 18 points in the game.

In the second half Salem put up a great battle and dropped only one more point behind. Kelly was again the high scorer for Salem, repeating his performance of the intersectional game with Medford high earlier in the season.

SCHAAF IS WINNER OVER W. STRIBLING

CHICAGO, Feb. 26.—(AP)—Ernie SchAAF, Boston's young knockout king, moved ahead as a heavyweight challenger by defeating W. L. (Young) Stribling of Macon, Ga., in their ten round battle fought before 11,000 spectators in the Chicago stadium tonight.

It was SchAAF's twenty-first victory in 22 starts. SchAAF defeated Stribling with his relentless powerhouse attack, shifting from the body to the head. He dropped Stribling with a short left hook to the chin in the fourth round, after connecting with four right uppercuts to the jaw. He scored the knockdown just as the bell ended the round and Stribling's seconds had to rush to mid-ring and drag him to his corner.

When the fight ended Stribling was bleeding profusely from ugly gashes under both eyes which were rapidly closing.

The verdict of the two judges and Referee Dave Barry was unanimous.

Mill City Wins County Title by Beating Aurora

A field goal in the last 30 seconds of play brought the Mill City grade school basketball team the Marion county championship in its class and a 12 to 11 win over Aurora in the final game played at the high Friday night.
