

GENEVA PEACE PLAN BLOCKED

Foreign Office Statement Contrary to Tenor of Truce Discussion

evacuation of a zone 12 and a zone 13 around Shanghai was an absolute prerequisite of any truce.

Although the memorandum setting forth the peace proposals did not specify an immediate armistice, Sir John Simon, British foreign secretary and one of the prime movers for peace declared that "unless the hostilities in the Shanghai area are stopped, this conference will not be held."

American Support Is Given Proposal

Ambassador Hugh R. Wilson of the United States, whose negotiations over the week-end with Sir John, the ministers of the other great powers and the representatives of the combatant nations assisted in maturing the settlement plan, formally set forth the support of the American government in a letter to Sir John Drexel, secretary general of the League.

"The government of the United States," Mr. Wilson wrote, "is happy to associate itself with this effort for the reestablishment of peace."

"My government will instruct its representatives in Shanghai, in the event that this offer is acceptable to the Chinese and Japanese governments, to cooperate with the representatives of the other powers."

American support for the plan already had been announced at a hastily summoned public session of the council by Sir John Simon, who at the same time pledged the fullest collaboration of Great Britain.

In presenting the proposal Sir John Simon said it had been hoped to hold the conference aboard the British flagship at Shanghai.

Scott, chairman of the state highway commission, said today that by March 16 the commission expected to have enough information on the proposed Wallula cutoff to determine whether it should be built on the grade originally proposed or on a new grade that would rise above any pools that would be formed if in the future power dams were constructed on the Columbia river.

Scott said he and Commissioner Washburne of Eugene favor construction of the cutoff and that Commissioner Aldrich will not oppose it.

"I have no intention of indefinitely postponing it," Scott said.

Infant Is Born On Her Daddy's Sixth Birthday

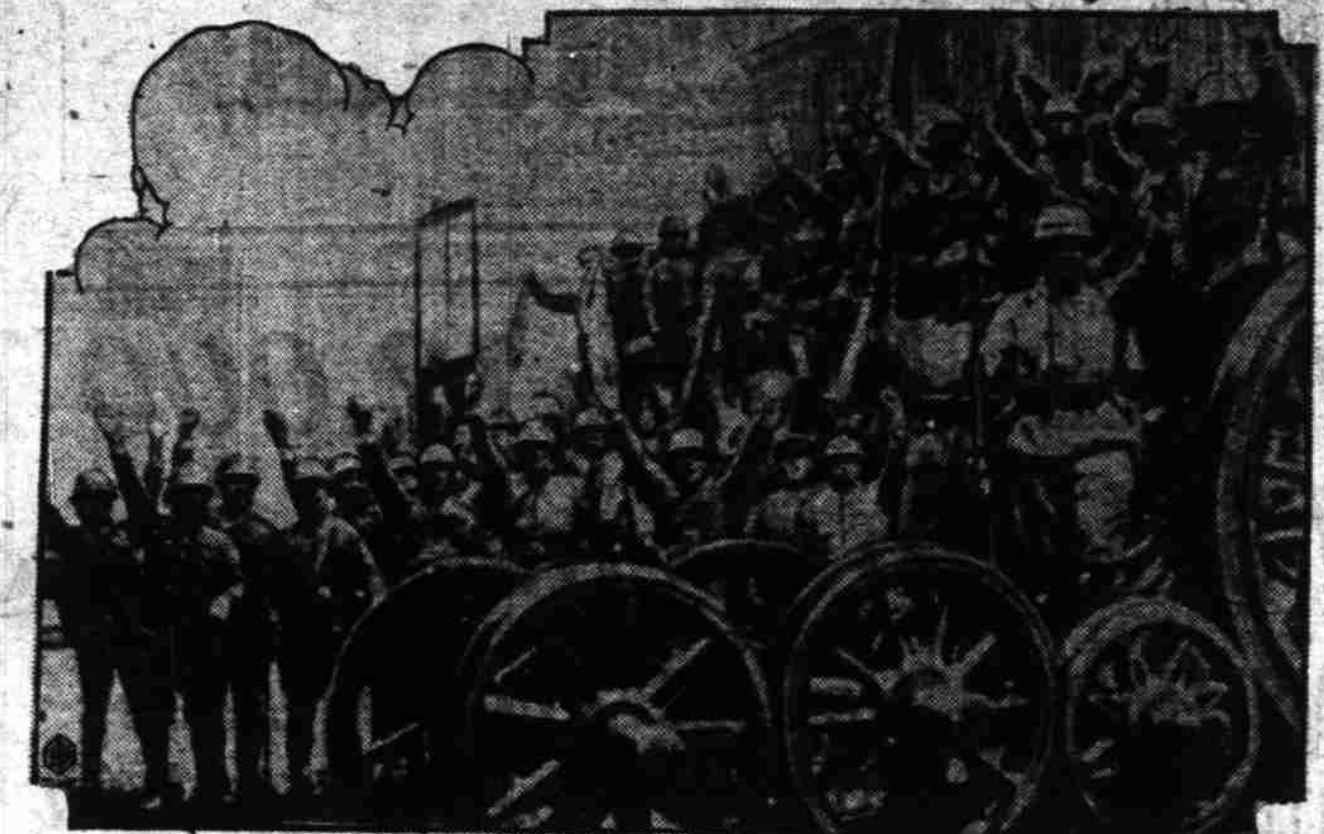

A few hundred other Japanese soldiers stepped ashore from a transport at Woosung. Heavy artillery and horses came with them in large numbers.

The Chinese held their lines on the big front from Chapel to Woosung. Their machine gunners and riflemen kept up a running fire, but there was only action from the Chinese big guns.

WARSHIPS MOVING FROM EAST COAST

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29. — (AP) — The might of the American navy is being mobilized in the Pacific.

Under orders disclosed today, ten warships will pass through the Panama Canal to join the powerful fleets which soon will hold maneuvers in defense on the Pacific coast. This will bring to 202 the fighting ships flying the American flag west of the canal.

The unexpected move, representing the first time the special service and training squadrons have been directed into such maneuvers, attracted widespread attention.

Asked if there was any relation between the sudden orders and the far eastern situation, navy officials replied their latest reports showed an easing of tension in the orient and emphasized a statement by Admiral Pratt, chief of naval operations, that a plan for such a ship movement had been "under consideration since the maneuvers were first announced."

Announcement of the maneuvers was made by Admiral Pratt in testimony before a house committee in January a year ago.
