

KENTWORTH IS STILL MISSING

Former Salem Fighter Said Murderer of J. Hansen, Also Known Here

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Miss Norman's warning Hansen opened the door and let him in. "Look out, Johnny, he's got a gun," the girl said, she shouted and Kentworth immediately produced an automatic pistol. He aimed the pistol at Hansen, who moved the gun aside. Kentworth, however, leveled the weapon again and fired. Hansen dropped, a bullet through his heart.

Miss Norman screamed and ran from the room, she said, and Kentworth fired at her but the bullet went wide. The girl notified the hotel clerk but before police, called by the clerk, arrived, Kentworth had fled.

Both Johnny Hansen, the victim, and Jack Kentworth, the alleged slayer, in Portland's latest murder case, were known to many fight fans in Salem. Hansen fought Eddie Buskirk of Penitentiary here twice last year, knocking him out both times. He won admiration for his gameness as well as for his ability. A week ago last Friday he was in Ad Cadena's corner when the Mexican fought "Tuffy" Wing.

Kentworth fought here several times immediately after being released from the state penitentiary March 2, 1929. He acquired a considerable following because of a crushing left handed hay-maker that produced knockouts, but was not a finished fighter and showed little disposition to learn or to keep in condition. He was, however, a game battler and showed good sportsmanship in the ring.

Kentworth had served two years for burglary committed in Multnomah county. It was believed here that Kentworth was not his real name and that he was connected with a prominent family in the east.

DEATH FEARED FOR PAIR SHOT

Jess Eddy, First Believed Hurt Worst, Better But son Weakens

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Farlow, Archie Eddy and Mays were going to the Farlow home for a cake. Erpelidg is said to have struck Geraldine Eddy, 16, in the mouth, after she refused to go upstairs with him. Ensuing events, it is said, were as follows: Erpelidg struck Mrs. Eddy in the face; her husband and brothers tried to subdue Erpelidg; a fist fight followed; then Erpelidg went upstairs to his room. Police fired at, No Shot Returned. A shot was heard from Erpelidg's room. Police later found a bullet hole in the door and wall of the room, made either by accident or to test the gun, they believe. Shortly after this shot, Geraldine, who had gone to her upstairs room, heard a number of shots fired downstairs. As the Mays group returned to the Eddy house, Erpelidg drew his gun on Mays.

As police, called on an alarm from the nearby G. E. Colgan home, 1249 Waller street, approached the Eddy house, Erpelidg is said to have fired at Officer Wintersteen, missing, then fled. The officers did not return fire, as reported, it was declared at headquarters last night. Officers Kuykendall and Strong captured Erpelidg on Cross street, one block south of Hines. Believe Burglary Has Been Solved.

Developing from the shooting affair, officers believe they have solved the burglary of the C. M. Roberts grocery, D street, on February 25. Groceries thought to have been taken from the store were said to have been found in the Eddy house.

According to their physician, Jess Eddy's wounds consisted of a bullet hole in one arm and another from the right shoulder blade to the right armpit, fracturing a rib and piercing a lung; Lloyd's, of a bullet hole ranging upward from the back and out through the right side.

Mrs. Eva Eddy, Geraldine, Dorothy and Bobby Eddy, Mrs. Farlow and Victorine, at first detained by police, were released yesterday evening.
