50 Years of Married Life Observed by McFarlands At Rural Home in Quinaby

CLEAR LAKE, March 5.—Mr. and Mrs. J. C. McFarland celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary at the home in Quinaby Friday, a large dinner affair being held at noon, and in the evening reception held for a large crowd of friends and neighbors.

Mr. and Mrs. McFarland were married at Eagle River, Clatsop county, Minnesota, March 4, 1882. On their wedding day, they recall, it snowed flakes almost as large as 50 cent pieces, and several of the wedding guests had to walk in snow up to their knees to reach the ceremony. Only two of their nieces present at the original ceremony attended the 50-year observance: Mrs. Ed Loose and Mrs. Mollie Pearmine of Salem.

Came West in 1885
The newlyweds of 50 years ago built a house at Eagle River, living there three years, leaving in 1888 for Oregon, where they settled at Eagle River. He taught the first year at Salt Creek school north of Dallas, and then they moved to Falls City.

He taught for 10 years in Falls City, instructing 50 pupils at a salary of \$33. Mr. McFarland was the first postmaster and storekeeper at Falls City, also the first city recorder and police judge.

Taught for 21 Years
They moved from there in 1895, settling at Clear Lake, where he taught for several years. He taught altogether 21 years before retiring, and handling his last classes during the world war at Beuna Crest school. He disposed of his farm at Clear Lake in 1906, moving to Salem where until 1909 he was engaged in a general contracting and building business. At the end of the three years they moved to Quinaby, the present home, where he conducted the first store for several years, selling to the present owner, A. M. Anderson. He was also Quinaby depot agent for seven years.

Are Retired Now
They built a modern home, and have been enjoying a retired life for the past years. A small garden and berry patch keeps them as busy as they want to be.

They have two children, both Minnesota natives, Mrs. George Becker of Quinaby and Mark McFarland of Salem. They have eight grandchildren, one passing beyond a year ago; and two great-grandchildren.
