Dr. H. H. Olinger, fourth present commissioner, last night declared he would not consider seeking the election because he already had enough civic jobs on his hands. He has been chairman of the school board for several years and this year was elected chairman of the public library board.

It is believed Fred H. Paulus, fifth commissioner, may decide to run. He is known to have said he might consider the matter and friends are urging him to do so, since he is a large taxpayer and accustomed to the affairs of public office. When questioned early this week he stated that he had not decided and would "see what the rest are going to do."

Until The Statesman inquired of some of the present commissioners concerning their intentions, they were not cognizant of their positions being subject to the May election. The city charter provides that a municipal official shall hold office until a successor is elected.

The city charter amendment passed at the December special election instructed the council to appoint five commissioners to serve until the next regular election. Commissioners elected in May will serve for four years.

Of the "four present" last December as the "people's ticket" for the water commission, two, R. A. Harris and I. M. Doughton, yesterday said they would not seek the office, while two others seemed still on the fence. "My name was brought out unbeknownst to me and I didn't want the position in the first place," Doughton stated.

F. G. Delano, "people's ticket" man, said, "I haven't considered it so far."

E. B. Gabriel announced he did not have any statement to make.

BOARD WHEAT MAY AID LOCAL RELIEF

Whether or not any of the federal farm board wheat which congress recently ordered distributed to the needy of the nation will be used by relief agencies in Salem has not yet been decided. Miss Thora Boesen, secretary of the Willamette chapter, American Red Cross, said here yesterday. The Red Cross is authorized to distribute 40,000,000 bushels of the wheat.

The matter locally will be referred to the Community Service organization, Miss Boesen stated. Doubt exists as to whether or not the Willamette valley area will be eligible to receive the relief wheat, since the act of congress states that the wheat is to be used "in the 1931 crop failure area for feed for livestock."

With the meaning of the act being broadened, the wheat in many instances will be ground into flour and distributed to needy persons, says a statement from A. L. Schaefer, San Francisco, manager of the Pacific branch area of the Red Cross.

It is the amusing plot which puts the play over, however, rather than the acting which is good but is not outstanding, partly because there are few "big moments." The walk taken by Miss Bennett and David Manners is a jolly piece to remember. Manners is really too big for the part he has in this light, amusing comedy.
