

# FORBES SPEAKS AT GRADUATION

### 50 Seniors to Finish at Monmouth Normal School Tuesday Morning

MONMOUTH, March 12.—Dr. L. E. Forbes, faculty member of the Oregon Normal school, will deliver the address to graduates at a special convocation Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock.

Vacation will begin Tuesday noon, extending until Monday morning, March 21, when the spring term opens.

Out of about 570 students now in school, 59 will be graduated; and 435 have registered for the spring term. Some have not registered, and it is believed there will be some decrease in the student body attendance for the new term.

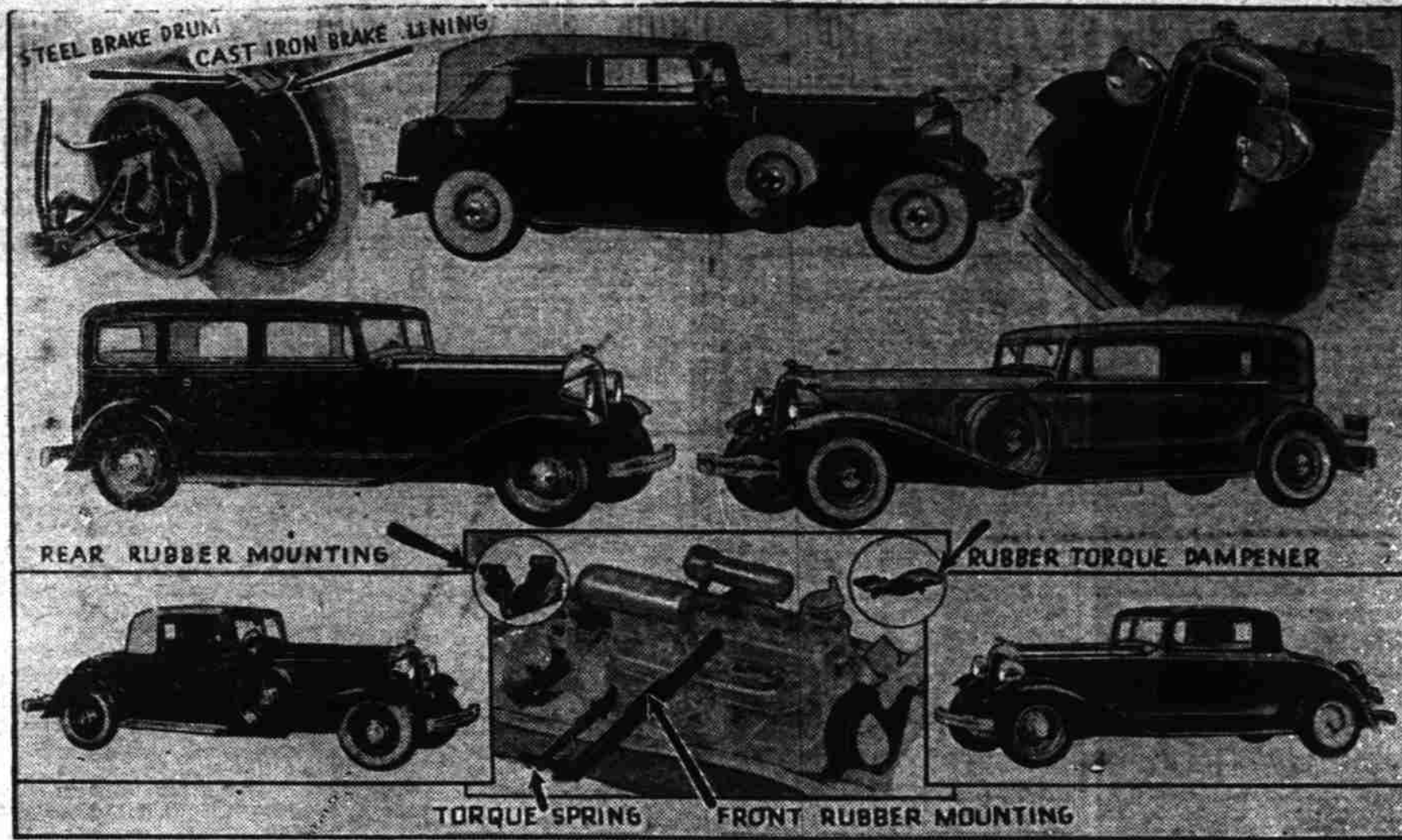
# BIRTHDAYS BRING JOINT OBSERVANCE
