Original Display Is Planned For Music Week

National Music week occurs the first week in May and the Federation of Music clubs in all states in the union have been entrusted with the carrying out of this celebration by the National Music week organization of Washington, D. C.

In Oregon this year we are presenting especially music composed by musicians of this state. In Portland an exhibit is being prepared of original manuscripts by Oregon composers to be shown in the art galleries of the Meier & Frank Co. store during National Music week.

This exhibit will consist of a sheet of original manuscript and a photograph of the composer. It will comprise three divisions: professional, amateur and juniors. The first division will include compositions by professional musicians; the second those who up to this time have studied and written music for their own amusement and the pleasure of their friends; the third, young music students of 21 years or less who show marked ability.

It is hoped to make the exhibit quite comprehensive and the Oregon Federation of Music clubs is most anxious to receive the name of anyone in the state of Oregon who is qualified to have work exhibited in either of the above classes.
