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## A. A. U. W. Will Support Peace Lecturer Tuesday

SALEM chapter of the American Association of University women decided to assist the local branch of the National Council for the Prevention of War in bringing Alden Alley, noted lecturer who will speak on some phase of the problems of the League of Nations. Prof. Alley is professor of international law at Dana college, New Jersey. He will speak at the First Methodist church Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock.

This plan was announced at the Saturday luncheon meeting held at the Gray Belle Saturday. It was also announced at this meeting that the state convention of the A. A. U. W. would be held in Salem October 14-15. This will bring several hundred women of the state to Salem for these two days.
