MEMBERS of the Salem Womon's club will be addressed Smith of the attorney general's office, at the regular meeting of the club Saturday afternoon.


Miss Smith will speak on three important legislative matters, the children's bureau, old age pensions, and the present pending maternal and infancy welfare bill now before congress.
