COURTHOUSE IS HELD EXEMPT

Jail Unsanitary, Breeding Place of Vermin, Word of Grand Jurors

the plates, etc., on which the food is served."

The grand jurors' report finds the cost of feeding county jail prisoners in Marion county is in excess of what it should be at the present time. Prisoners in Lane county are fed for 13 cents a meal, the jurors report, less than half of the charge made for feeding prisoners here. The net cost of feeding prisoners in Eugene is \$2961 a year compared to \$5998 in this county if a like number of prisoners were cared for, the report reads. Including in the Lane county costs the services of a janitor who also has charge of feeding the prisoners, the total cost for food and janitor would only be \$3285 a year compared to \$5998 for a like number of prisoners in this county, food alone being furnished.

Jailers could put Prisoners to Work

Recommendations of the grand jurors include the furnishing of better toilet facilities for the prisoners who at night are locked into cells which are not provided with sanitary toilets. "If a jailer is employed for this county, the prisoners under his supervision could be employed to clean up, paint and repair the courthouses," reads the report. "We further recommend that the prisoners who enter the jail in this county have their clothing fumigated to prevent vermin being brought into the cells."

Reporting on conditions found at the state penitentiary the grand jurors declare: "All departments of the prison were found clean and well kept. The food furnished the convicts was inspected at the noon meal when they were being served. It is well cooked, ample in quantity and of sufficient variety to furnish health and aid for the hard labor that is required of them."

The report comments on the recently completed prison block as follows: "The new prison block has but recently been completed with but one hired helper and under the supervision of the superintendent and warden. The building is entirely fireproof and is built according to the most modern ideas of advanced prison construction. It has large, well ventilated and well lighted cells. In each cell is a regulation toilet and running water. There is room for 320 convicts in this new block. "On the lower tier of cells are what is known as 'correction cells.' These take the place of the old and now abandoned 'bull pen' about which we have heard so much complaint and about which volumes have been written in criticism. We highly commend the board of control and the prison officials for this much needed improvement. It was erected at a cost of \$60,000, which means a saving to the taxpayers of an equal amount."

The jurors also commended the improvements now being made in the prison chapel and throughout the entire old prison block. Much of the improvements are credited to J. W. Lewis and Warden Hall, who have spent many years at the prison and under whom, the jurors declare, "everything is functioning smoothly." The jurors declare "There is and always has been a splendid cooperation between these officials. The handling of prisoners is something that cannot be acquired in a short time. It is experience, gained by many years of service, that enables prison officials to become efficient."

Thursday morning, both men said they thought the intelligent way in which the firemen worked not alone saved several of the front offices in the Breyman and White buildings but probably prevented the fire from spreading into the Hamilton building.

Windows in the front second story of both buildings were not broken by the firemen and thus the draught of the fire was checked. Water damage in the offices upstairs was comparatively small. Valuable records in the offices of C. M. Inman and E. P. Boise were not injured. The extensive law library of Mr. Inman was damaged by smoke but none of the books was destroyed. His office equipment was spared by the heat.

Estimates on the loss stayed at about \$100,000. Insurance on the library and furniture in Inman's office was \$500.

The Salem Engraving company's plant was a total loss. Insurance carried was at least \$5000.

The stocks of Byrne's, Director's and Macfar's stores were totally destroyed. Loss to the Hamilton Furniture store's stock was entirely due to smoke and water and was roughly estimated at \$5000 to \$10,000.

WASHINGTON, March 24.—(AP)—Secretary Mills announced figures today indicating a definite improvement in financial and economic conditions since congress and the administration acted to keep banks open and end money hoarding.

Making no predictions, they had let the statistics speak for themselves. They showed there had been a decrease of \$157,000,000 in circulation of money since President Hoover inaugurated his anti-hoarding campaign and that bank closings had virtually ceased since the reconstruction corporation began operations.
