may be blocked by fire, leaving a window, too small for an exit, the only possible means of escape. The electrically controlled central locking device on rooms at the girls' school is also held by the jurors to be inadequate in case of fire.

Woodburn School
The architecture and equipment at the boys' training school are reported by the jurors as the poorest in any state school visited. The food given boys and the discipline maintained is praised. Fire-escapes for the boys' cottages should be provided, the jurors state. "The state should take the lead in protection against fires," report the jurors.

There are now 63 boys in the school, 615 being out on parole. Seventy-five per cent of the inmates come from rural areas where officers have exercised a less rigorous supervision over recalcitrant youths than in the cities. Fifty-five per cent of the boys are adjudged to be of normal intelligence, 30 per cent below normal and 15 per cent of morose calibre.

Criticism is directed at the segregation methods employed by school authorities. The boys are now placed in groups by age rather than by the character of their offenses, a practice with which the grand jurors find fault. School is conducted regularly at the training school with the boys preferring drawing and carpentry to book studies. One hundred and sixty-five acres are tilled at the school, each boy being required to work. The jurors found that most of the boys gained in weight after admission to the school, corporal punishment is used and the "Oregon boot" is banned.

SYNDICALISM LAW DRAWS CRITICISM

Right of Free Speech Held Paramount in Address By Dean Hewitt

"If we prohibit freedom of speech, either all progress stops or revolution must result," declared Dean Roy R. Hewitt of Willamette university, collector of law Sunday night at Union hall. A hundred and fifty persons assembled to hear the proposed repeal of the Oregon criminal syndicalism act discussed.

"Deprive a man of freedom of speech, deprive him of his life and he is made a martyr," the dean continued. "What he said, even though wrong, will be expanded out of all proportion. Speech has a tendency to refine ideas. The best way to explode erroneous theories is to allow the promulgator of them to speak. His ideas will be refined and the erroneous portion exploded."

Dean Hewitt contended that freedom of speech, like protective coloring in animal life, has a survival value. The human being survives by being intelligent. Intelligence is the power to receive and use information; and information when used has a survival value.

"When you shut off freedom of speech, you stop the flow and accumulation of information. Freedom of speech is any means of conveying ideas, whether spoken words, pictures or writing."

Second speaker of the evening was Irvin Goodman, Portland attorney, who fought to gain the release of Ben Boloff, Portland laborer who two years ago was sentenced to 10 years in the penitentiary on charges of criminal syndicalism. After serving one year and three months in Multnomah county jail and the penitentiary, Boloff recently was released on parole by the trial judge.

While in prison, Boloff contracted tuberculosis, Goodman said. Blame for this was laid to the incarceration and to lack of proper medical attention. At the state penitentiary, Goodman averred, medical service consists of a part time physician and dentist. The bulk of medical treatment, he went on, is administered by a convict who does not possess a physician's license.

Boloff, scheduled to attend the meeting, was unable to leave his sanitarium.

C. C. Hulet, candidate for the republican nomination as congressional representative from the second district, made an unscheduled address concerning "gag" law. He opposed the criminal syndicalism law, he said, and related instances in which he claimed, such acts had resulted in injustice.
