

COACH SPEARS ACCEPTS CALL

Decision is Made Following Conference With Mucks, Professor There

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calling for a salary of \$11,500, was not in keeping with the program of economy outlined by the board of education.

Negotiations had been under way for several weeks between the University of Wisconsin athletic authorities and Coach Spears. Recently the University of Oregon coach was reported to have sent a final refusal of the Wisconsin offer, adding the statement that his only reason for considering the change at all was the uncertainty status of the university and its sports program in view of the changes contemplated by the state board of higher education. He said at that time the question of future athletic policy had been settled to his satisfaction. Later negotiations were reopened.

Announcement that Spears is leaving Oregon is expected to create a furor in sport circles in this state, with perhaps some sharp criticism of higher education board as responsible for his departure.

Pending Dr. Spears' final decision, there has been no open speculation as to his successor. In view of the unsettled status of the university, which would be under the direction of a chancellor who is not yet named, it is probable that no decision will be made for some time.

There is great possibility that some present member of the coaching staff will step into the shoes, and the most logical choice appears to be "Bill" Reinhardt, former Salem man who has been assistant to several successive head coaches. Reinhardt is however, already coaching basketball and baseball coach and he takes over football, some additional changes are practically certain.

It is believed that the pilot was endeavoring to get below the mist when he crashed into the high tension power lines that set his plane afire. Only one man was taken from the wreckage alive, and he succumbed shortly after reaching the hospital.

School Budget Accepted Without Any Alterations

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liminary draft of a budget had been mimeographed and copies were supplied all persons present. The session was held in the library, and the room was well filled with patrons of the district.

The "gallery" consisted largely of people from South Salem who were alarmed over reports that McKinley and Lincoln schools were to be consolidated. They were there en masse to enter protests. Don Upjohn intervened at one point to get the committee to take up the matter so the visitors could get their say in and go home; but the budget committee said it was a good thing for them to stay and hear the proceedings. At the end they were advised no mergers were in prospect.

Reducing Teachers' Pay Moot Point

The meeting waxed warm over the question of reduction in teachers' salaries and over operation of the auto repair shop in the manual arts department. John Hunt and Ted Chambers urged the necessity of making reductions in account of the financial condition of the district and the distress of taxpayers. Harry Olinger and Frank Neer of the board were quick to resent the suggestions. They insisted teachers' salaries were lower here than elsewhere and that they would not be party to paying starvation wages. Olinger cited wages paid city policemen and firemen as considerably higher than the average wage of teachers who had had to take advanced training. Neer insisted teachers were working on practically a 1914 basis.

Mr. Hunt responded "How long can the district maintain itself and not go broke? Other cities are forced to make reductions and many districts are in bad shape." He proposed making a cut of 5 per cent for teachers drawing \$1200 and under, 10 per cent on

TREND 'BACK TO LAND' OBSERVED

The back-to-the-farm movement, now on, is the greatest movement in the history of Oregon, E. G. Harlan, secretary of the Eugene chamber of commerce, told local Kiwanis club yesterday noon.

Harlan declared only three millions of the 13 millions of potential farm land in Oregon is occupied, and pointed to these 15 millions of land as the drawing card for countless settlers from California and the middle west. The vanguards are already coming, he said.

Drouths in the specialized crop states of the mid-west, drought in California and increasing Mexican population in California from Sacramento south, all contribute to focusing attention of farmers in these areas of Oregon, "where rain is the greatest natural resource," Harlan said.

The diversity of farming in Oregon, and the ability to make a living on small acreage instead of standing or falling on a specialized crop, such as the corn of Iowa, are attractions which the disheartened of the south and mid-west cannot overlook, he suggested.
