

S-H BOYS EARN PROFIT OF \$69

Figures Is Average; Frank Bartos has Gross Income of \$1145

WOODBURN, March 30.—An average gross income of \$229.74, with a net profit of \$69.53 and a labor income for the students of \$109.44 are shown in the final report on vocational agricultural home projects completed last fall, according to figures of R. E. Burnett, local Smith-Hughes instructor. The cash returns were only slightly under those in 1930, despite lower prices for farm products. The total gross income for the whole department increased due

to larger projects and more being completed but the net profit and labor income dropped slightly. Gross income from 48 projects totaled \$11,326.55 and expenses \$7988.79 leaving a clear profit of \$3337.55. This is after the student paid himself 25 cents an hour for his own work and also paid for labor done by other members of the family, five percent interest on the investment, depreciation and all other charges. The value of the students own labor amounted to \$1483.61 which he paid to himself thus making a labor income to the students of \$4821.16.

The figures for the previous year show a gross income of \$9,785.76, net profit \$3464.98 and \$4825.47 labor income from 41 projects. Frank Bartos had the largest project with a gross income of \$1145.39 and a labor income of \$579.02. He owned three sows from which he produced 47 pigs weighing a total of 5595 pounds when sold, raised eight acres of corn and four acres of strawberries. He has added a purebred
