Jaunt to Northern Part of New Jersey is Believed Highly Significant

December would be exhausted by the heavy early evening traffic.

A night police bulletin said any information concerning the colonel's trip must come from him.

Sensational conjectures sprang from the fact that Lindbergh and Elizabeth carried a suitcase and a blanket when they entered the colonel's plane at Newark.

The latest trip of the colonel's made it even more evident that he was determined to do personally whatever might be necessary to restore his son.

Earlier questions to state police about the colonel's first trip since the kidnapping a week-end journey brought this response:

"Colonel Lindbergh feels that under existing circumstances he would be privileged to move without the incumbrance of either check-up or accounting," state police said in response to questions about the trip.

"When he is able to make any statement he will be glad to do so through Trenton and in accordance with the established system (of communication with officers at the Lindbergh home)."

The famous flier left his Springfield estate sometime Saturday night, for the first time in 24 days.

He returned shortly before midnight Sunday night, accompanied by 24 unidentified men.

Canneries, Road Work Hold Key To Job Outlook

Unemployment conditions in Oregon during the coming summer will depend largely upon the activities of the Willamette valley canneries and state highway operations, according to the view of H. R. Baldock, state highway engineer, and Charles H. Gram, state labor commissioner.

Baldock declared that approximately \$4,000,000 of highway construction contracts would be awarded within the next few months, and that this work would require a large number of men. Contracts already awarded aggregate more than \$750,000, Baldock said. The latter contracts are widely scattered and do not include the larger projects now under consideration by the state highway department.

WHITE HORSES ON INCREASE, SHOWN

America is fast becoming land of white horses.

This is the belief of Dr. W. H. Lytle, in charge of the animal husbandry division of the state agricultural department.

Lytle said this was due partly to the fact that many breeds, particularly Percherons, turn gray and white when old age sets in. This is why a large percentage of white horses are noticeable on western ranches, he said.

"White horses on the range are rare," Dr. Lytle continued. "Short of complete confidence in the fairness of the range horse ranks by taking heavy toll of the older animals, handicapped by defective teeth and stiffened limbs."

Dr. Lytle said there recently had been a sharp increase in the number of horses in use on farms. He attributed this situation to cheap feed and high priced distillate.
