DALLAS—Plans for the thirtieth convention of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs, May 25 to 28, at Portland, are nearly complete according to Mrs. W. R. Minsinger, the program chairman.

The executive board will meet at 10 o'clock the opening morning at the Multnomah hotel, official headquarters. A complimentary luncheon for the board is being planned by the Portland City Federation, the hostess club.

The opening session of the convention will convene Wednesday afternoon, when special committees will be appointed and officers will present their reports. A reception will be held in the evening for the visiting delegates and the George Washington bicentennial theme will feature the program.

The formal sessions of the convention will open Thursday morning with committee reports and routine business. The afternoon will be given over to a tea at the Doernbecher hospital with an opportunity to visit the institution and the dedication of a tree in honor of Mrs. Sallie Orr Dunbar, the Oregon candidate for recording secretary of the General Federation. Part of the program will feature talent from the Chemawa Indian school arranged by Mrs. W. H. Byrd of Salem, state chairman of Indian welfare. The city federation is planning other entertainment for the remainder of the afternoon.

The evening program will be given over to the public welfare department, of which Mrs. Frank Duff, Adams, is the chairman. A special address and music are being arranged.

Friday morning the silver trophy will be presented to the district with the most new 100 per cent club subscribing to the Oregon Clubwoman. Evelyn Wilson Young, business manager of the magazine will make the presentation. Proposed revisions of the state constitution will be presented by Mrs. Ida B. Callahan, chairman, of Corvallis.
