### COMMISSIONER AND SHERIFF CONTESTED

Political Aspirants in Polk County run High; Three Seek Clerkship

DALLAS, April 6—Polk county has her share of aspirants for political recognition at the primary election with the offices of sheriff and county commissioner luring the most candidates. The filings for the sheriff's office are: T. B. Hooker, of Dallas, republican and incumbent; T. Grover McDonald, Dallas, republican; H. S. Zimmerman, Falls City, republican; E. E. Hart, Rickreall, republican; C. E. Stewart, Monmouth, democrat; Robert H. Walker, Rickreall, democrat; and Wiley A. Carpenter, Dallas, republican.

The office of county clerk was less attractive but will be contested by two republicans and one democrat. These are Hugh G. Black, Dallas, democrat and incumbent; J. G. McIntosh, Independence, republican; and Carl S. Graves, Sheridan, republican. The five contestants for the office of county commissioner are: C. C. Gardner, Dallas, democrat and present commissioner; Elbert Parrish, Dallas, democrat; Harrison H. Brant, Independence, republican; George W. Curtis, Dallas, republican; George Kurze, Dallas, democrat.

Those seeking the office of county assessor are: Fred J. Holman, Dallas, republican and incumbent; A. G. Rempel, Dallas, republican and Ed C. Dunn, Dallas, democrat. Four filings were made for county treasurer: E. A. Hamilton, Rickreall, republican and incumbent; W. R. Howe, Dallas, republican; W. R. Ellis, Dallas, republican; and Will Boydston, Dallas, democrat. Joshua Willis, republican of Dallas, has filed to succeed himself as county school superintendent and is unopposed. C. W. Menkle of Dallas, republican, is unopposed for the office of coroner which he now holds.

Two republicans have filed for place on the republican county committee: R. R. Riggs of Bridgeport and R. S. Kreson of Dallas. The democratic party reports a full ticket for the democratic county committee. Filings for other offices in the county are: Verd Schunk, Monmouth, republican, constable for district 5; J. A. Goser, republican, constable for district 2; and Charles Gregory, Dallas, republican, justice of the peace in district 3.

### FOUR IN COURT ON GAS THEFT COUNT

Four men were haled into justice court yesterday on charges of larceny, all involving thefts of gasoline. Bower and Owen Byers were brought up together, charged with stealing 15 gallons of gas from Alfred Hoppenhill. Byers, 17, was certified to the juvenile court. Bower asked 34 hours in which to enter plea, and is in jail, failing to furnish \$100 bail.

George Wirth and Emil Johns, alleged to have stolen 55 gallons of gasoline from M. A. Hammer, appeared before Justice of the Peace Miller Hayden late in the afternoon.

Wirth and Johns both asked 34 hours in which to enter a plea, and bail was set at \$150 each. They are in jail. Wirth and Johns have both been up before Judge Hayden before. Wirth has a traffic violation on his record, the specific charge being use of improper license plates. He was released only recently from jail after being given a 60-day sentence by Judge Hayden on charge of larceny of automobile parts.

### VOTERS PAMPHLET WORK IS STARTED

The secretary of state announced Wednesday that one filing for office at the primary election, in addition to those announced Tuesday night, had been received at his department. This declaration of candidacy was filed by Donald J. Ryan of Oregon City, who is seeking the republican nomination for state representative for Clackamas county.

The state department Wednesday launched upon the task of certifying to the county clerks all candidates for office at the primary election, and preparing the voters' pamphlet. The pamphlet must be printed and in the mails 15 days prior to the primary election. The time for receiving statements for the pamphlet expired last night. Officials said the pamphlet would be one of the largest ever issued by the state department in connection with a primary election held in Oregon. The certifications of candidates will be sent to the county clerks within the next 15 days. Supplies for the primary election are now being assembled by the state department.
