ITALY FAVORS U. S. DISARMAMENT IDEA

GENEVA, April 13—(AP)—The conflict between the American and French disarmament proposals was accentuated today when reinforcements rushed to the support of each plan.

Foreign Minister Dino Grandi of Italy led the advocates of the American scheme to abolish such important aggressive weapons as tanks, heavy mobile guns and gas. He added a proposal to abolish battleships, airplane carriers and bombing planes gradually. Spoken for Turkey and Brazil also lined up behind the United States proposals.

Criticism of the American plan, voiced yesterday by Andre Tardieu, premier of France, was echoed by the representatives of Poland, Yugoslavia, Spain, Uruguay and Persia.

Economy Group Fails to Agree With President

WASHINGTON, April 13—(AP)—Unable to reach an agreement with President Hoover on how to handle the \$200,000,000 retrenchment program the divided house economy committee hopes to decide tomorrow whether it will continue to sponsor a federal salary cutting plan.

Commenting from the White House after a 12-hour conference with President Hoover the committee members said they had not agreed on the chief executive's proposal to put all the program into one consolidated bill. Neither was an agreement reached on any of the points of controversy between the administrative and legislative branches on the program.

Strange Illness Prostrates 300 At Santa Paula

SANTA PAULA, Cal., April 13 (AP)—Nearly three hundred persons were stricken here today with a mysterious illness, the majority being confined to bed. More than half the victims are children.

Victims were affected first with extreme nausea, followed by symptoms similar to those of pneumonia. This gave rise to theories that the cause would be found in water, milk or vegetable supplies, especially if the vegetables had been sprayed with poisonous insecticides.

No one was reported to be in a serious condition.

Arkansas House Refuses to Quit

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 13—(AP)—With cheers and enthusiasm, more than two thirds of the membership of the Arkansas house of representatives refused to recognize Governor Harvey Parnell's order dissolving the special session of the legislature and met here today to attempt to enact legislation for governmental economy.

Eight Burn to Death on Farm

ALTOONA, Pa., April 13—(AP)—Eight persons, seven of them children, were burned to death in a fire at Hensheytown near here shortly before midnight.

Four of the dead were children of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Dillon, whose home burned. Mrs. Goldie Hollobaugh Krebmer and her month old baby also perished.

HITLER ORDERED TO DISBAND HIS ARMY

BERLIN, April 13—(AP)—The German government today ordered Adolf Hitler to disband his army of 400,000 national socialist shock troops and to put an end to the terrorizing activities for which it held him and his legions responsible.

This sudden blow at the strongest single political organization in the nation came in the form of an emergency decree signed by President Paul von Hindenburg. Police throughout the country proceeded to enforce it by invading the various Nazi headquarters and seizing materials of war and propaganda.

The presidential decree dissolved immediately all "quasi-military organizations of the national socialist workers party, especially the storm troops and police formations, with all staffs and other institutions belonging thereto, including observers and reserves; motor, marine and cavalry divisions; aviation, automobile and sanitation corps; training schools and barracks, and supply departments."

Composer Dies While Hearing His Own Music

NEW YORK, April 13—(AP)—Smiling at a broadcast of his latest song "One Day in May," Robert A. King, a composer of fifty years standing, suffered a heart attack today and died within a few minutes. He was 69.

Under the name of Mary Earl,

King had been writing musical melodies since he was a youth. Possibly his greatest success was "Beautiful Ohio Waltz" which he wrote at the age of 24 and which sold more than 5,000,000 copies.
