

BIG CROWD HEARS DAN POLING SPEAK

Seven hundred people representing all shades of politics, all temperance groups and many civic groups, crowded the banquet held in Portland Tuesday night when Dr. Daniel D. Poling, national youth leader and member of the Allied Forces, spoke, according to his father, Dr. C. C. Poling, who returned to Salem yesterday after spending Monday and Tuesday in Portland.

Dr. Poling particularly stressed the fact that any referendum on prohibition not merely affects prohibition, but attacks the constitution of the United States and the country's very form of government, the local Presbyterian minister said.

Dr. C. C. Poling said that the Allied Forces movement which his

son heads is far ahead of its original goal. A million persons, the goal for the work of the group scheduled to end June 5, signed for prohibition two months ago, and the second million signers will be secured. Instead of the 261 cities the Allied Forces proposed to reach from last September to June, 696 will be reached.
