Initiative measure was to be prepared for November submission, calling for the consolidation of the University of Oregon and Oregon State college into one school.

Then yesterday Hector Macpherson, former state college professor and a legislator of importance—perhaps the father of the initiative measure—broke into print with a scathing criticism of the board, its expenses, its indecisiveness and its inability to work out a harmonious program. Macpherson prognosticated trouble and plenty of it when the legislature meets next January.

It is well known fact that the campuses at Eugene and Corvallis seethe with rumor, complaint and uncertainty. Everyone is upset and no one seems satisfied. The alumni of the university at Eugene are organizing to protest at things as they are in higher education. Certain members of the board are linked at internal problems of that organization. All in all, the higher educational picture is far from a quiet scene and much may happen within the board or within certain groups opposed to the reorganization program slowly being worked out.

Personally, Oregon's political leaders or would-be leaders spent a comparatively off-page-one week. Governor Meier was away from his office more than half of the time. Rufus C. Holman, busy campaigning for treasurer, followed the advice of political friends, and said little to bring press attacks although the announcement of the list of "approved hotels" brought laughter from certain officials and newspapers and bad words from the innkeepers.

James W. Mott, like C. C. Hulet, was here and there making thrusts he figures will help his race for congress. Emmett Howard thus far has done little in his campaign in this district. Locally Allan Carson is working steadily for votes in his race for district attorney. William H. Trindle is becoming more active against him. Judge McMahon left judicial duties for two days to spend much of his time in the field campaigning for Trindle. Douglas McKay's friends are pushing his candidacy for mayor; the Hollywood backers of Mayor P. M. Gregory, realizing they have a formidable opponent to their man, are organizing the city to secure the mayor's re-election.

The average voter, whoever that mythical man may be, is as yet little interested in the local, county and state races. The winners in any of the races do not seem clear. It is yet a month until election and in politics the month just preceding election is as important as a year before that time.

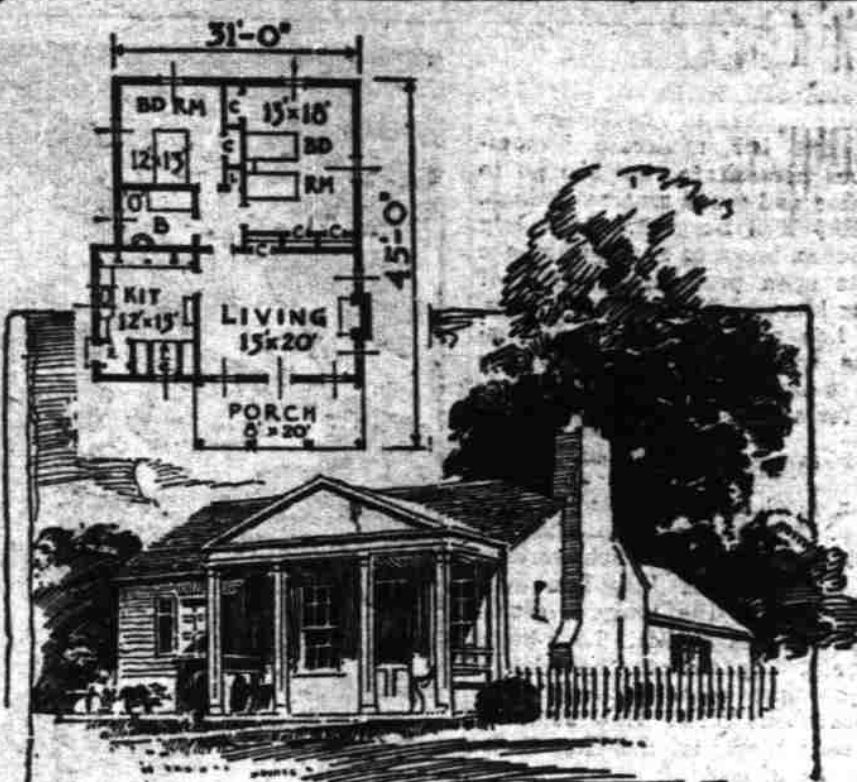
Arthur Clarke, Attorney, Dies

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GOOD NEWS FOR BUDGETS



This is a bungalow type house suitable for a man with a small family who has modest capital with which to build.

It has exceedingly compact design, and can be built for as little as \$2000 to \$2500, depending on locality and owner's choice of materials. Also, it may serve as a summer camp at the lakes or in the woods.

The living room is reached directly from the entrance porch, and is spacious with a fireplace at the end. The kitchen serves as dining space at breakfast and lunch. The end of the living room, provided with a table, can take care of more formal meals. A hall

off the living room to the rear left joins the two bedrooms and bath.

Exterior walls are of ship-lap siding exposed about eight inches to the weather. The end wall, where the chimney is, can be of brick, together with the chimney, which is topped by red chimney pots. Shingle, slate or flat tile may be used for the roof. Shutters are blue green, and the woodwork, ship-lap siding, porch posts and pediment are all painted white.

This house can face in practically any direction, but west would be most satisfactory. In a suburban or rural area it would on a most any sized lot from 50 feet wide on up.

ROAD VIEWERS TO START LONG HIKE

County Engineer Hedda Swart is contemplating a 50 mile hike with the board of road viewers starting Monday, the duration of the trip probably to be at least a week, and will take the group through numerous mountain passes with much of the trek through snow. The road viewers are from Linn county and will also be accompanied by Charles Leonard, Linn county engineer. The object is to view the North Santiam highway route.

The party will view the entire route in Linn county from White-water on the Linn county line to the junction with the south road, which distance in itself will total some 21 miles, and the viewers will find it necessary to do some walking over this portion. From the junction the party will walk back to Fish Lake, then along the highway to Seven Mile hill, down the hill some distance south to a point which may be reached by a cat.

Since the part of the highway to be viewed is entirely in Linn county, to make the proceedings legal, cooperation from the court of that county was necessary, the viewers working under the direction of the Linn county court. Swart states that under present mountain conditions, there is a possibility of some tough going and therefore it is doubtful how long the trip will take. Two packers will be required for the party.

Drastic Changes In Parole Board Law to be Asked

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NAZARENES ATTACK EFFORT AT REPEAL

Wet Move Really Anarchy, Resolution Declares; Delegates Chosen

Referring to efforts directed toward repeal of the prohibition act as "an attack upon the constitution of the United States and in final analysis, anarchy and rebellion," 200 delegates of the North Pacific district assembly of the Church of the Nazarenes, in session here yesterday adopted a resolution supporting the amendment.

The district assembly, which closes its six-day session today, yesterday accepted the invitation of Rev. Donald J. Smith of First Church, Portland, to meet there for the 1933 conference.

Delegates yesterday elected to the general assembly at Wichita, Kan., in June are: Dr. J. E. Bates, district superintendent, Portland, George W. Franklin of India, Elsie M. Wallace of Seattle, E. J. Lord of Newberg and Donald J. Smith and Ernest G. Johnson of Portland. Lay delegates elected are Mrs. J. E. Bates, Mrs. E. J. Lord, Miss J. Norris of Newberg, Mrs. Ernest G. Johnson, Mrs. Donald J. Smith and Mrs. A. J. Schoke of Vancouver, Wash. The resolution on prohibition, reported by Rev. Fletcher Gallagher of Salem, chairman of the committee, and Donald J. Smith, secretary, follows:

"Resolved that this Assembly go on record as being unqualified in its support of the 18th amendment to the constitution of the United States, and the Volstead Act for its enforcement and the various state laws enacted thereunder."

"Resolved that we actively oppose the insidious propaganda of the wet interest in seeking to break down public sentiment for the prohibition laws and their enforcement. And that we launch a campaign of education and information to strengthen these laws."

"Resolved that we consider the present effort to repeal the prohibition laws of the United States, and Washington, as being attacks upon the constitution of the United States, and in final analysis, anarchy and rebellion."

"Resolved that our people be urged to use their constitutional rights in voting in every election and that our local church leaders assist in giving out information with reference to the state candidates on the prohibition question, and that this information be given without reference to political party lines."

"Resolved that we use every effort to strengthen the hands of those entrusted with the enforcement of law."
