

STATE TO REST ITS CASE SOON

Some Large Purchasers of Empire Stocks Among Late Witnesses

"Western" stocks on the balance of note for \$3750 on a basis of two "Western" shares for one Empire share. Metzger later traded these stocks in the Empire corporation for a larger subscription of \$20,000 and gave a note for the balance of \$15,000. Frank Lowman, in the cross-examination, questioned Metzger closely in regard to the details of the transaction involving the "Western" and succeeded in getting the witness to admit that the Empire corporation had never completed the deal of trading "Western" stock for Empire stock. The witness also admitted that he did not know just where he stood in the deal and was not certain as to what stocks he really owned. Frank Schumacher, official witness, Frank Schumacher of Hillsboro was the last witness of the day. He testified that he had purchased

five shares of Empire stock from a salesman named John S. Clark and had paid \$250 down and given a note for the balance of \$250. Later he received a letter stating that if he wished to buy more stock he had better buy it before the price jumped to \$112.50 as it was expected to do soon. Another salesman called upon him and he subscribed for five shares more. There was some mix-up and the deal went on record as being for ten shares. After getting the matter straightened out, Mr. Schumacher took the five shares more and paid \$50 cash and gave a note for \$450. When cross-examining the witness, Mr. Lowman had a hard time to get him to answer the questions as Mr. Schumacher wanted to tell his whole story at once regardless of the wishes of the attorney. The state has presented more than three-fourths of its witnesses and will soon conclude its case. Attorneys for the defense have called 18 witnesses and these will take the stand at the conclusion of the state's case. It is not probable that the case will go to the jury before the latter part of the week. Hugh Black, Polk county clerk, stated that the approximate cost of the trial was \$400 a day and that the cost of the witnesses for last week amounted to over \$1500. Witnesses are being paid ten cents a mile for transportation under the Polk county basis for mileage.
