

# Local Track Squads Face Initial Dual Meets This Week

## BEARCATS AND NORMAL CLASH

### Willamette men Lacking in Competitive Experience But Reveal Promise

The Willamette university track team will go against outside competition for the first time this season Friday in a meet with the Oregon Normal school, to be held at Monmouth.

Rains have kept the dirt track here in too soft condition to hold an interclass meet, so some of the men may be a bit handicapped as far as meeting outside competition is concerned. However, Burgess Ford has worked with a gun and watch for several weeks and has his men fairly well paced.

Then many of the men have had experience in high school meets and should be able to perform up to standard.

Last year the Monmouth Normal took a track meet from Willamette, but it will have to place a much better team on the field this year to do the same.

## BEARCATS STRONG IN GYMNASTICS

The Bearcats are strong in practically all of the running events and will probably be able to get a number of firsts in the races. Other strong points will be in the weights and on the low hurdles. The jumpers and pole vaulters have been working in the pits for only a few days and will probably not make extra good marks this early in the season.

Advance hope, on the basis of showings made by the men in daily practices indicates that Willamette has the best team in years and Friday's meet will be a test to see whether the men pan out as predicted.

## SALEM NET SQUAD BEATS SILVERTON

After being rained out on two previous meetings, Salem high and Silvertown high got together Wednesday to finish their tennis meet which Salem won, 5 to 2, taking four singles and one doubles match and losing only one singles and one doubles.

Friday the Salem high netmen will meet Newberg here for a return meet, having defeated Newberg before.

Last Saturday Salem high was rained out when it tried to play University high at Eugene, but the campus men will be met later.

University high is planning to have a state tennis tournament at the University of Oregon later in the season, probably late in May, and the Salem men are working hard in hopes of winning some of the honors in that meet.

## GAME ARRESTS BY POLICE SHOW GAIN

Declarations made by Oregon protective associations in Salem that the state police department had fallen down in the enforcement of the state game laws, are not supported by the records of either the state police nor of the state game commission, it was disclosed Wednesday.

The records show that the first 10 months of the state police department was in operation the arrests for game violations exceeded those for the entire year 1932 and also 1929. Fines collected for game law violations during the first 10 months of state police activities were \$10,000 greater than in 1929.

The state police records show a total of 719 arrests and fines of \$34,424 during the six months from August 1 to February 1. The biennial report of the game and fish commission revealed that from October 1, 1929, to September 30, 1932, a total of 676 arrests were made with fines aggregating \$25,762, while for the same period a year previous, 723 arrests were made with fines totalling \$27,443.

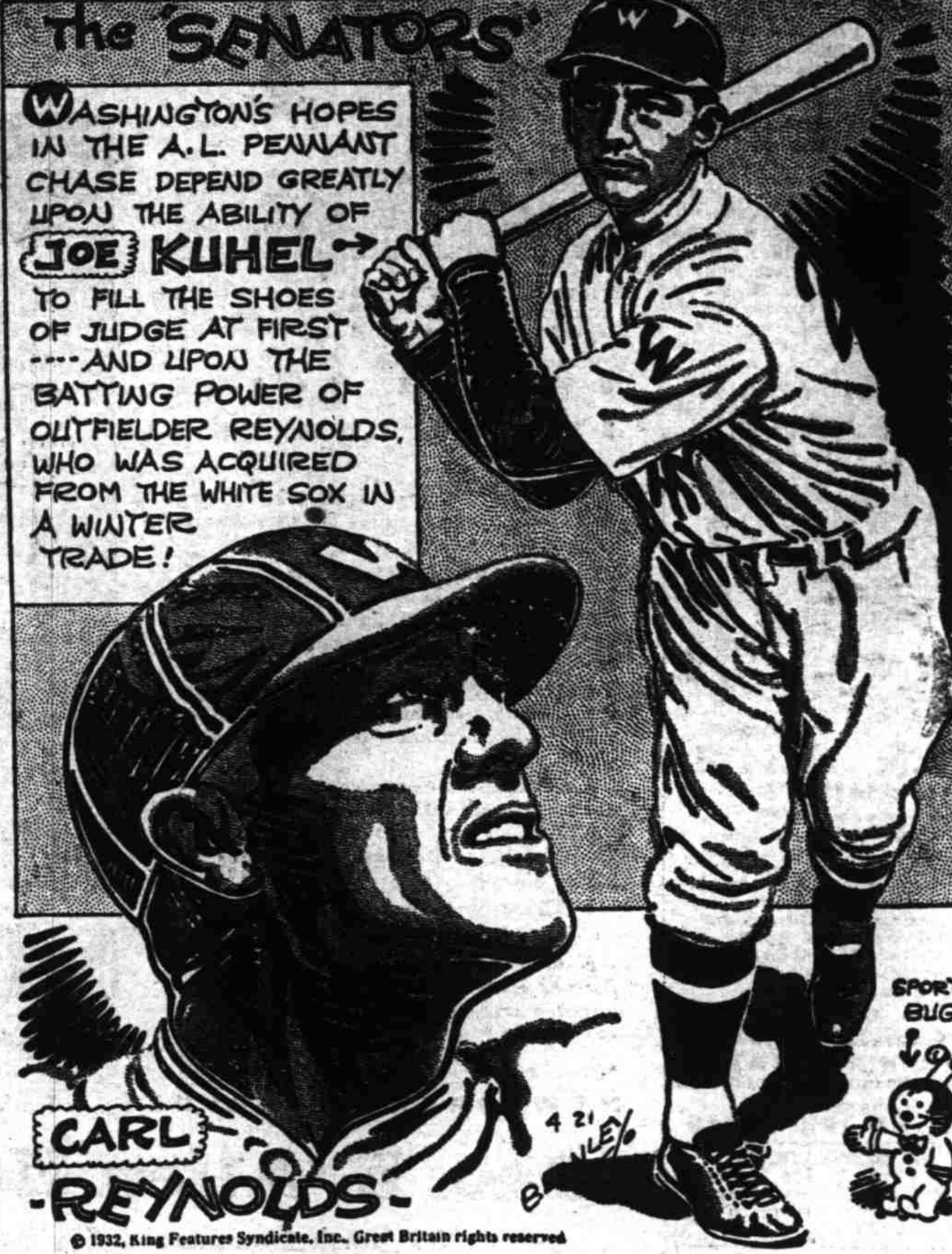
The result is that a fine large jumping pit was constructed on the women's athletic field.

## What Price Senators?

THERE is one city in the American League whose baseball fans want the American League bunting to go to Washington, to the exclusion of all other camps. That is Washington, of course. There are seven other cities full of fans who would rather see the pennant go to Washington than to any other city but their own.

This, undoubtedly, is a personal tribute to Walter Johnson, "The Big Train," an immortal as a hurler even before he hung up his glove, and now the manager of the Senators.

A pleasing thing about it is that "The Big Train" hopefully believes that this is his year. Of course there are the A's, who have occupied that top perch for three years running and still have Grove, Earnshaw, Walberg, Cochran, Fox, Simmons, etc., with some new fence-busting recruits.

There are still the Yanks with Ruth, Chapman, Dickey, Penneck, Gomez, Pippas, filled with ambition for another world series melon. In spite of that and in spite of the obvious disinclination of most of the experts to concede Johnson's outfit more than a third-place berth, there is a feeling among the Senators that they are destined for higher things.

They finished a strong second in 1932, and third last year. Since last Fall they traded "Bumpy" Hadley, a temperamental youngster, and Sam Jones, 40-year-old veteran to the White Sox for Carl Reynolds, fleet, but brittle outfielder, who had a poor season last year but is a star when his trick knee doesn't bother him. He is a regular .300 hitter, and finished with an average of .359 a couple of seasons back.

There can be no doubt that Johnson counts on Reynolds as a pivot man of the new Senator offense.

At first base there will be young Joe Kuhel, who displaced the sterling Joe Judge in the middle of the 1932 season. Judge has long regarded Kuhel as his ultimate successor and has spent much time teaching him the finer points of play around the initial sack. If Kuhel lives up to Judge's opinion of him, there will be few better first sackers in the country this year.

Cronin is probably the best shortstop in the American League. Bluege is far above the average around the hot corner. Myer is a dependable second-sacker, fast, and a pretty good hitter. Manush, in left field, once led the league in batting, and looked good in Spring training—better than for some years. Sam West is a wonderful center fielder, and Reynolds will do splendidly, barring injuries, in right. The utility outfielder will undoubtedly be the best in the business—old Sam Rice, who is still good enough for a steady berth on any team.

Spencer will do the bulk of the catching—he caught 145 games last year and the pitching staff, even without Jones and Hadley, stacks up as a winner. Marberry, Crowder, Brown, Fischer and Burke, with the rookie Weaver look good.

There is not the smallest factor will be the directing hand of a broad-shouldered gentleman named Walter Johnson.
