INDEPENDENCE, April 21—The entire staff of teachers in the Independence high school have been re-elected for the coming year with the exception of Prof. and Mrs. Homer Dixon, who resigned. Professor Dixon has accepted the principalship of the Madras high school. His place here as coach has not been filled. Miss Margaret Eddy, daughter of Mrs. J. B. Violette of Independence and a senior of the Willamette university, has been chosen to fill the place in the English department made vacant by the resignation of Mrs. Dixon. Prof. Paul E. Robinson was re-elected to serve his 16th consecutive year as the principal. Other teachers are: Howard Bennett, Smith-Hughes instructor; Miss Dorothy Young, commercial and girls' athletics; Mrs. Fern Wheeler, home economics; Mrs. Hazel Stalsburg, history and English.

ENVIRONMENT AND HEREDITY TALKED

SILVERTON, April 21—Dr. H. H. Kleinsorge, chairman of the Silverton school board spoke on the influence of heredity and compared it with the influence of environment at the Tuesday night meeting of the Silverton Teachers' association. Dr. Kleinsorge indicated that while environment could do much to mar perfect heredity, it could not entirely overcome undesirable inherited characteristics. He used charts to illustrate his points and his listeners expressed themselves as having been exceptionally interested in his subject. During his talk he made the statement that it would take 60 years of careful breeding to eliminate feeble-mindedness.
