

# Peterson Fans 23 but Bearcats Lose in 12th, 3 to 2

## STATERS WILL BE HERE TODAY

### Bearcats Also Outbit big School's Team, Suffer Some bad Breaks

The Willamette Bearcats played exceptionally good early season baseball Friday in a heart-breaker at Corvallis which Oregon State won, 3 to 2, in the 12th inning, despite the fact that Andy Peterson, Bearcat hurler, allowed only seven hits and struck out 23 men. Willamette collected 10 hits from three pitchers.

This afternoon at 2:30 on Olinger field Coach "Spec" Keene's Bearcats will again tackle the Oregon State crew. George Erickson, freshman hurler from Clatskanie, will pitch today's game with Andy Peterson probably playing in the outfield. Peterson hit the high average of .598 per cent for the entire season last year.

George Erickson has looked good in practice and Coach "Spec" Gill's men will probably get do a great deal with his offerings.

## Oregon State Gets Two Unearned

Oregon State punched over two runs in the fourth after they should have been retired to the field. With two out Andy fanned Baechtel who went to first when the third strike was dropped. Then Cronin ducked an inside ball which either hit his bat or his shoulder, but the umpire's decision said it was his shoulder and two men were on base. Keema then placed a slow roller down to third which Gribble fumbled and the bases were loaded.

## Woodard, starting pitcher for the Beavers, then conked a neat single which scored Baechtel and Cronin.

Willamette put across a run in the fifth and whether in the seventh, Gribble hitting both of these innings and scoring the first time on Peterson's single and Gill's double and the second time on a fielder's choice and Moore's Texas leaguer over the second baseman's head.

## Mack Leads Rally That Decides Game

The pitching duel continued for five innings with neither side scoring and then Mack hit on for Oregon State, and went to second when Johnson bunted and was safe on an infield cross-up. Jensen popped a bunt fly to Peterson for an out and then "Honey" Blacone smashed a single which scored a run.

Several times Willamette had men on the bases but failed to score, once on a bad bobble when a runner thought erroneously that the center fielder dropped a fly, and walked into a triple play with two on. Coach Gill saved the game by replacing Woodard with Lundberg in the ninth with two on and then putting in Peterson to finish the game.

Coach Keene stated Friday night that his team went much better than he anticipated for the first game. The players were well satisfied with the game except that they regretted to see Peterson lose after such a spectacular showing.
