Senate Finance Committee Votes Double Levy for Normal Incomes

comes over \$1000.000. The present maximum is 20 per cent.

Reductions by the house in the personal exemptions from \$1500 to \$1000 for single persons and from \$3500 to \$2500 for married were approved. This adds a million or more taxpayers to the rolls.

Corporation Levy Up

From 12 to 14 per cent.

The corporation income levy was raised from 12 to 14 per cent. The house voted 13 1/2 per cent. The added tax of 1/2 per cent on consolidated returns by affiliated corporations was eliminated.

A two-cent stamp tax on checks of more than five dollars was approved.

The house provision subjecting corporate stock dividends to the normal tax was eliminated.

The exemption from the gift tax was raised from \$3000 to \$5000 and the house rate retained.

A move by Senator Reed (Republican, Pennsylvania), to cut down the high inheritance rates voted by the house and protested by Secretary Mills was overwhelmingly rejected.

The new income tax schedule received a vote of 16 to 1, with Senator Couzens (Republican, Michigan), in opposition.

TESTIMONY TAKEN IN CALBREATH CASE

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Lindeman, 18, and Harold Bushman, 13, both of whom were in the car which Calbreath drove; Calbreath and Sergeant Powell Clayton of the state police.

State's witnesses declared the car was travelling between 50 and 60 miles an hour through Sublimity, except Miss Hotendorf, who said it was going "fairly fast."

The girl recounted how Calbreath had asked to take her home from school, and how she in turn had asked him to take home Zelmie, who had missed her school bus. She could not recount just how the accident occurred.

The defense drew upon the old model of the car which Calbreath drove that day, and upon the slippery pavement to point that the accident was unavoidable. Both Lindeman and Bushman testified that the car was not going more than 25 to 40 miles an hour at any time on the trip from Stayton toward the girl's home out from Sublimity.

Chief evidence for the defense was that of Sergeant Clayton, who said he arrived at the scene of the accident five minutes after it happened, and that his investigation did not indicate reckless driving. He said three times on the car were slippery, and that "oil or something ejected by the foliage of a maple tree" which overhung the highway made it so slippery that he discovered the wheels of his car would spin, even in high gear.

Infant Rescued From Cold Plunge Into Well; Mother Dives in Too, Saves Child

SILVERTON, May 27.—Little John Slinkard, two and a half year old son of Mrs. Mollie Slinkard, is recovering from his cold plunge into a 12-foot well at the Gus Karstenson farm near Drake's Crossing, 12 miles east of Silverton, Monday morning around 11 o'clock.

The story, as it reached Silverton Tuesday, is that little John was playing about outside and Mrs. Slinkard was in the house caring for a younger child. She heard John scream and ran out to find he had fallen through an 18-inch opening in the top of the well. The well had been covered, but she said, someone must have pushed the covering aside. Mrs. Slinkard grabbed a long two-by-four and dropped it into the well to hold onto and then dived in herself. She was able to grab the baby as he came to the surface but he was by then unconscious. She threw him out onto the ground and climbed after him. The water was about 23 inches from the surface.

For two and a half hours she worked to revive the little fellow and was finally repaid for her effort. She reported that she had once read in a doctor book that if anyone was drowned to roll him back and forth until the "water came out." Mrs. Slinkard, who is a Russian, said the "water came out of his mouth all right fast." She also said that she rushed in the road a few times and tried to stop passing motorists but none understood that she wanted them to stop. Mr. Slinkard is employed at camp. Although it was not definitely known here Wednesday it was believed that his given name is Charles.

EIGHT FIREMEN TO BE DROPPED, PLAN

If eight men are dismissed from the Salem fire department on May 1, as contemplated by the council fire committee, the savings for the remainder of the year will amount to about \$10,000 a year, according to Chairman W. H. Daney. According to figures compiled late last month, a reduction of \$9119.89 in expenses was needed to balance the salary budget of the department this year.

Four of the 12 men on duty at the north and south fire stations, to be closed, will retain positions on the force. They will be selected by Chief Harry Hutton, according to seniority of service.

Three of the eight men to be dropped from active service may be employed temporarily for several weeks after May 1 as substitutes for two firemen now ill with appendicitis and for Captain William Hunt, who suffered a broken shoulder as the result of a recent accident with fire equipment.

Assignment of St. John's Lutheran and the Livingston parochial schools will be made later.

Roosevelt Gets Vote of Alaska, Returns Reveal

JUNEAU, Alaska, April 27.—(AP)—The Roosevelt-pledged delegation led by John W. Troy, chairman of the territorial democratic committee, appeared assured of election tonight with additional returns from the voting yesterday in Alaska's primary. The delegation will have six votes at the democratic national convention.

With two slates of delegates before the voters, both pledged to Franklin D. Roosevelt, the lead in returns compiled tonight. Approximately half the democratic vote in the territory had been counted.

EDWIN WOOD GIVEN BREYMAN CONTRACT

Edwin P. Wood, Salem contractor, 55 Mission street, was awarded the general contract for the rebuilding of the Breyman and White Corner buildings on North Commercial and Court streets. The properties were gutted by fire, last month. The amount of the contract to Wood was not announced by the Boise contractor but a building permit for \$20,000 was issued yesterday at the city hall.

Breyman Boise announced Wednesday that Wood would have some work begun almost immediately on the building. He said sub-contractors would be let by Wood for plumbing, heating, roofing and other phases of the work.

Reconstruction of the downstairs of the two buildings within 60 days is anticipated while a month more will be required to complete the second story which is used for office purposes.

Money System Draws Attack At Convention

OMAHA, April 27.—(AP)—The American money system was attacked here Tuesday by speakers addressing the national convention of the Farmer-Labor party.

Jacob S. Cozy, who led "Cozy's Army" in the march on Washington in 1924 and who now is mayor of Massillon, Ohio, termed the present money system "absurd." He urged the government inflate the value of labor and commodities" by issuance of enough government currency to pay the soldiers' bonus and set every idle man at work on public improvements."

Darrow to Quit After This Case

HONOLULU, Apr. 27.—(AP)—Clarence Darrow, aged criminal lawyer who came out of retirement to defend Lieutenant Thomas H. Masie and three others accused of lynching Joseph Kahahawai, announces tonight, a few hours after making his final plea, that this would be the last case of any importance he expects to enter.

SENIORS' FOOD IS STOLEN ON PICNIC

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Ernest E. Larjos stated that taking the food was that of a poor college prank but that breaking into the building in which the food was stored constituted a felony. He immediately advised state officers in Salem, by long-distance telephone, who suspects of the theft were, as identified by seniors who saw the food deposited at Easton hall at 6 o'clock Wednesday morning.

At a late hour Wednesday night, state officers reported that nothing had been done, but it is expected that the matter of the breaking and entering of the building will be investigated today.

MRS. T. H. TEMPLE DIES IN PORTLAND

Word has been received in Salem of the death of Mrs. T. H. Temple in Portland on Wednesday. Her husband, Rev. T. H. Temple, was former district superintendent of the Methodist Episcopal church in this district.

During the time she spent in Salem, Mrs. Temple was very active in the women's organizations of the church. Two years ago she moved to Portland where Rev. Temple was placed in charge of the conference claimants' permanent fund.

Besides her husband Mrs. Temple is survived by a sister and an adopted daughter.

Funeral services will be held Saturday, April 30, at 2:30 from the Holman and Lutz funeral parlors in Portland. Several of his former associate ministers will be in charge.
