Seldom out of his new 200-mile-per-hour airplane for more than a day at a time, Col. Fierro in large measure is conducting the affairs of Mexico's largest State from the skies. The colonel, widely known in the United States and elsewhere for his aerial exploits, feels that to a considerable extent the future of Mexico is intertwined with its progress in aviation. He sees the airplane aiding not only in the administration of internal affairs in the rugged and oftentimes inaccessible country, but playing a big part in creating a warmer bond between Mexico and its neighbors. Col. Fierro recently organized Mexico's first flying school and already has an enrollment of twenty students.
