It was patent that his use of the long name was an intentional affront to the Corvallis institution, though perhaps good nature in its spirit. Corvallis writers didn't take it that way.

Anyway there appeared exhortations of Mr. Neuberger both in the O. S. C. Barometer and in Burton Hutton's column in the Gazette-Times, both of which made vitriolic reference to Neuberger's "ed lack of maturity—some at a prase as 'not dry behind the ears.'"

We don't plan to take any part in it; in fact we're neutral.
