PALS OF THE "BIG TOP"

Traveling aboard three special trains, the Al G. Barnes circus will be in Salem on Wednesday, May 11, for performance at 2 and 8 p. m. With the big show this season are three herds of elephants none more famous than Old John, the pilot or lead pachyderm who has been with the show for 25 years. There are less than 200 elephants in America and all excepting a few are natives of India. The exceptions are the few from Africa. The distinguishing marks of the two species are principally the ears. With the African elephants the ears are much larger and when the huge beast becomes angry the ear resembles a large fan.

The Indian elephant is much gentler and consequently more easily adapted for his life with the circus. Of all beasts the elephant is the most sagacious. He never forgets. Trainers aver that after a lapse of half a century the elephant will conduct his performance as perfectly as if but 24 hours had gone by. Only a few elephants have ever been known to have been born in America.

Jumbo, the biggest elephant ever exhibited in this country, was nearly 10 feet tall. He was an African animal and very stupid but always good-natured. He was killed by a switch engine while en route from the show grounds to his car, at St. Thomas, Ont., in July, 1885. He was never south of Louisville, Ky., or west of Omaha. Jumbo's stuffed hide may be seen at Amherst college, while the skeleton is on exhibition in the museum of Yale university.

According to Captain Joe Metcalf, the superintendent of elephants with the Al G. Barnes circus, their food is principally hay. They will thrive best on an exclusive diet of a good grade of hay with the usual bushel of peanuts they "mooch" during the day. The elephant is rightly termed a "hay burner," for even the smallest will consume several hundred pounds daily. Their appetite is best tested by the fact that they eat almost continuously 20 hours a day. It is seldom they sleep more than four hours. Possibly one out of a score will ever lie down to sleep.

TELEPHONE FIRM'S TAX PAID; \$34,196

Payment of \$34,196.87, representing the personal and real property taxes of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company in Marion county for the first half of 1931, was made yesterday by H. V. Collins, district manager. A check for the amount was turned over to the sheriff's office.

The telephone company's taxes in Polk county, amounting to \$2,889.55 and in Yamhill county, amounting to \$1208.11, also are being paid by Mr. Collins.

Real and property taxes in Oregon being paid by the telephone company for the first half of 1931 amount to \$398,599.38. The company's total federal, state and municipal taxes, together with franchise and other payments, in Oregon for the entire year will be approximately \$1,118,242, according to Rev. Collins. This amounts to \$8.40 per year per telephone, on the basis of the number of Pacific company telephones in Oregon on April 10, 1932.

HEALTH APPRAISAL TO BE MADE HERE

A new appraisal of the work of the Marion county health department will be made beginning in mid-June, Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, announced Wednesday. Services of Dr. W. F. Walker, now connected with the Commonwealth fund, who appraised the health unit annually from 1925 to 1929, have been obtained at no cost to the local department.

Dr. Walker will determine improvements made in the unit's work during the past year, check for efficiency, amount and quality of health work done. Records kept by the department, calls made by nurses and physicians, and examinations made will come in for scrutiny.

When Dr. Walker first appraised the local unit seven years ago, he rated it at 200, with 1000 as the perfect score. The appraisal made by Dr. Vernon A. Douglas with Dr. Walker's assistance in 1930, showed the department standing at the 346 mark. It is expected to drop around 100 points this year on account of curtailment of activities.

City Pamphlets To Voters Sent Out by Poulsen

Mailing of pamphlets regarding the firemen's civil service amendment to the city charter which will be voted on at the May 16 election will be completed today or tomorrow, City Recorder Mark Poulsen announced yesterday. Six clerks under the direction of Miss Edith Birch, stenographer in the recorder's office, were put to work at the court house Wednesday addressing the 12,500 copies which will be sent out.

The job this year is bigger by around 2500 copies of the proposed amendment. About 10,000 pamphlets were sent out for the 1930 election.
