HATCHET IS BURIED IN SCHOOL TROUBLE

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McCallister as an accomplice to the attack, twice during the day requested Principal Fred D. Wolf to suspend the lad. When the requests went unheeded, the superintendent took the matter in his own hands and sent McCallister home.

Later in the day, Hug obtained information leading him to believe McCallister was innocent of premeditated participation in the affair. He then announced that the lad was on probation and said he would confer with him this morning.

City police investigated the attack but left the situation in the hands of the school authorities. The superintendent was emphatic in stating that it is "obligatory on the school authorities to protect the students" and that action to this end might be taken. Dr. H. H. Olinger, chairman of the school board, classed young Cross as a "rank outsider" since he had been expelled from school and declared that "is no more up to us to act against him than to the peace officers."
