WORD IS RECEIVED FROM HUGH FOUKE

First word from Hugh B. Fouke, pastor of Jason Lee M. E. church here who is a delegate to the general conference in Atlantic City since the conference machinery got under way late in April was received by friends here yesterday.

Rev. Fouke writes: "The conference is mighty interesting. The major work is done in committees and the general conference sessions—about 900 delegates—takes the reports of these committees as basis for their discussion and action. It's an immense machine and disconcerts as well as thrills one in it for the first time.

"Atlantic City is marvelous; a stretch of beach and abundance of resort hotels and such as you could find nowhere else in the world."

"The trip across was most interesting and every day took us into varying scenery and some new state. The east has more miles of good roads, more mansions for homes and more Rolls Royce autos than I recall ever seeing before. Not much evidence of hard times externally except many houses for rent or sale, and those with whom I talk suggest that appearances are deceitful and that things are mighty bad and growing worse."

Mrs. Fouke and their three children are at Atlantic City also. They are staying at the President hotel.
