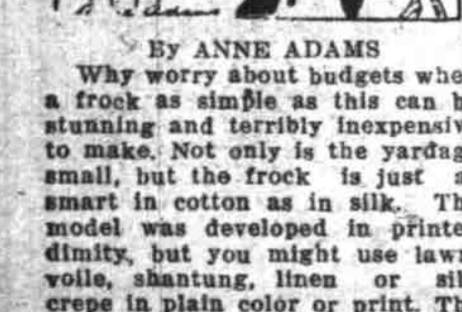
## Bridge Tea Will be Event of Week

Turner citizens regret very much to have the depot closed, and are hoping a petition signed by the business people for a local agent will be probably considered by the railroad officials.

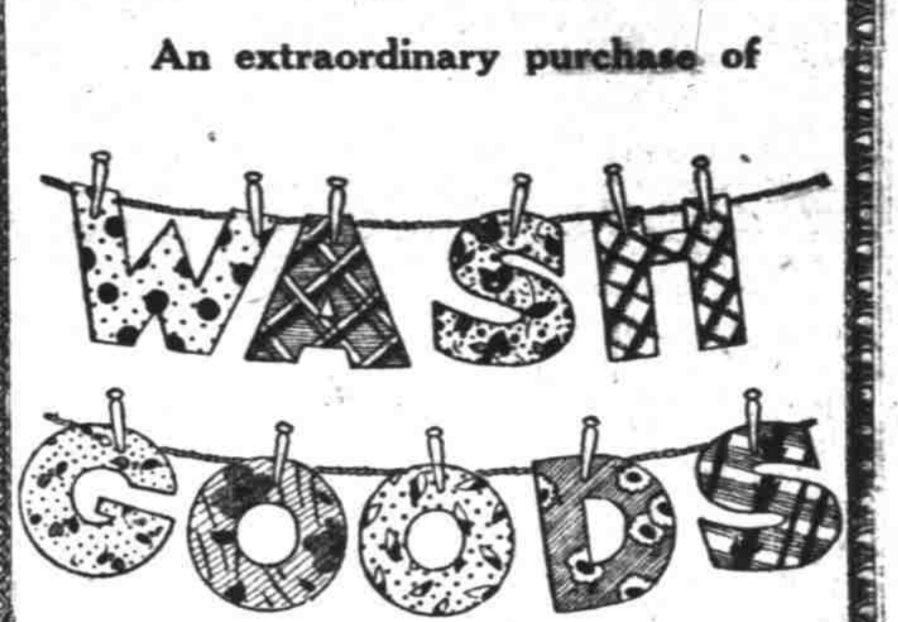

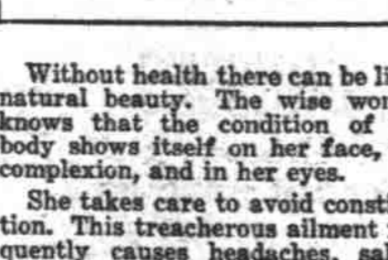
