EMMA MILLER DIES AT STAYTON HOME
STAYTON, May 16—Mrs. Emma Miller died at her home here Sunday night, shortly after 10 o'clock. This another of the sterling pioneers of this section has gone to her last reward. She had been ill one week.

Emma Thomas was born in Gentry county, Missouri, May 1, 1857. She crossed the plains with her parents, Charles and Mary Thomas, in 1855. They located near Salem, later moving to Sublimity, in 1869 they moved to Stayton and still later located on a farm one and one half miles east of town. Here she lived until her marriage to J. R. Miller, February 2, 1927.

She is survived by her husband, one sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Stayton, of this place, two nephews and six nieces.

Funeral services will be held at the Baptist church here on Tuesday at 2 p. m. Interment will be in the Lone Oak cemetery here. Mrs. Miller united with this faith when about 13 years of age and was always a faithful attendant, taking active part in church work as long as her health would permit.

She had been a member of the Grange for many years, and also of the home economics of the organization. It was the custom of this club to often meet at her home. She enjoyed telling of the good old days, when she first knew Stayton, a small settlement in the timber. She was affectionately called "Aunt Em" by her many relatives and friends to whom her passing has brought deep sorrow.

The home where Alphonse Capone, Chicago's fallen gang lord, will spend the next eleven years, though much more prestigious as regards size than the crime baron's palatial home amid the winding palms of the Underworld. In Atlanta there are no French windows that lead to sun porches, no well-kept lawns with tinkling fountains, no luxurious bathrooms tiled in all the colors of the spectrum and no soft-spoken valet to lay out his monogrammed pajamas. Instead, Al's new residence will be a rhapsody in grey. Grey stone walls, a grey prison courtyard and maybe a grey denim shirt with a number instead of a monogram. The discipline that prevails in the Federal prison. Accustomed to having his orders obeyed under pain of death, Capone will be at the receiving end of commands for the next eleven years. His one consolation is the fact that his name is now upon a roster among those of such distinguished law-breakers as George Remus, millionaire bootlegger of Cincinnati; Eugene V. Debs, once Socialist candidate for the Presidency; Warren T. McCray, former Governor of Indiana; and John W. Lang, of Kentucky, the first Congressman to be sent to Prison. Al is known to have a penchant for seeing celebrities, now he's doing it at the behest of Uncle Sam.
