During jury which had deliberated 23 hours. Barnett Goldstein, prosecutor, stated today that he wished to talk with John Carson, district attorney for Marion county; L. H. Van Winkle, district attorney for Washington county; and a corporation counsel before stating definitely whether or not Coshov would be retried. He said it would be doubtful if this would be settled before the Stockman trial is finished. If Coshov is tried again, his trial will follow those of Dr. W. R. Adams and I. H. Petty.

Jay Stockman will be represented by Dexter Rice of Roseburg. Lars Bergvik of Salem and Oscar Hayer of Dallas. Mr. Rice conducted the questioning of the jurors today.

Barnett Goldstein, prosecutor, commissioned an assistant attorney-general, will lead the prosecution in this case. He will be assisted by the district attorneys of Marion and Polk counties, John Carson and Elmer Barnhart.

Cost About Same

As Keller Trial
Hugh Black, Polk county clerk, stated that the cost of the Coshov trial would be about \$3750. This amount does not include several bills which have not been received so far. This figure is some \$30 less than the cost of the Keller trial but it is expected that it will exceed that of the Keller trial when the definite figures are available.

Whether or not the case of the State vs. O. Coshov will come up again for trial rests in the hands of the attorney-general, District Attorney John H. Carson said yesterday. L. V. Van Winkle's office was not prepared with a statement on the matter yesterday. Unless the state moves to dismiss the case, under the Oregon law the case must be retried since the former judge is under indictment for devising a scheme to defraud. The presiding judge must set the case for retrial within a reasonable time unless a motion to dismiss is made by the plaintiff.

The jury in the Judge Coshov case was dismissed Tuesday night after being out 23 hours and failing to agree. Seven votes for conviction and five for acquittal were reported when the jury was dismissed.

NO MORE DINNERS AT MINTO'S HOTEL

J. G. "Jack" Bullard, who has cooked two meals daily since last November for transients at Chief of Police Minto's flophouse on third floor of city hall last night heaved a sigh of relief. The last dinner to be given out this season was served yesterday. For a short time, probably until the present supply of food runs out, breakfast will be served the transients.

The number of men availing themselves of the flophouse is averaging lower than a few weeks ago, varying from six to 50 a night.

Although no appropriations were made for maintenance of the hotel de Minto during the past winter, meals have been served regularly and as many as a hundred men a night have been accommodated during the busiest season. Members of the police force and friends have regularly donated funds for operation of the place and a number of merchants have given foodstuffs.

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MINA FOLTZ HELD FOR JURY PROBE

Mrs. Mina Foltz, Woodburn nurse who is accused by Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Donaldson of Woodburn of attempting to poison Mrs. Donaldson, was yesterday bound over to the grand jury by Justices of the Peace Miller Hayden.

Preliminary hearing in justice court occupied almost two days, and because of the mass of material brought up there, Judge Hayden said yesterday he felt the entire matter should be laid before the grand jury. The case was finished in justice court last Thursday, since which time Judge Hayden has had it under advisement.

The Donaldsons contended that Mrs. Foltz administered poison to Mrs. Donaldson because of influence she held over Donaldson. The man declared the nurse used narcotics in his food to poison his mind against his wife.

Mrs. Foltz denied giving the poison deliberately and said it was a mistake, and that she immediately administered an antidote. She further denied intimate relations to which Donaldson testified between the two.

CHANGES IN STATE SALARIES FAVORED

The bill which the so-called farm bloc of the senate and house proposes to introduce at the 1933 legislature providing for a reduction of salaries of various state officials, probably will also include a revision of the salaries affecting a number of chief deputies in the state departments.

This was indicated Wednesday by one of the men who has in charge the initial draft of the proposed salary bill.

The measure will provide that the salaries of the deputy secretary of state, deputy state treasurer and private secretary to Governor Meier shall be reduced from \$300 a month or \$3600 a year to \$200 a month or \$2400 a year. This was the pre-war salary of these three officials. The salaries of these officials are fixed by statute, and are subject to change by the legislature.

There also is a possibility, it was said, that reductions also will be proposed in the salaries of a number of district attorneys and other district and county officers. These salaries were increased by the legislature four years ago.

The group sponsoring the bill includes hold-over legislators.
