aspect of such a course, it seems to me that an intelligent self-interest would indicate the wisdom of getting solidly behind an Oregon man, especially one so well qualified by learning, experience and temperament as Dr. Kerr.

The late Dr. Campbell, whom I also was privileged to know real well, once told me that he considered Dr. Kerr one of the finest men in Oregon, both as a citizen and as an educational executive. This high opinion has frequently been echoed by many outstanding champions of the higher education, here and elsewhere. Would not then the importation of a high-salaried man be tantamount to confessing an inferiority complex?

Dr. Kerr knows Oregon, the conditions that prevail here and the psychology of our people. A newcomer would have to acquire this decidedly essential knowledge. That would be a waste of time and an expense to the state wholly unnecessary and hardly defensible under existing conditions.

It has been intimated elsewhere that the university might oppose Dr. Kerr's selection in a "dog-in-the-manger" spirit. This is unbelievable. I sincerely hope for the everlasting credit of Oregon, that faculty and alumni of O. U. will emphatically resent so unfair a reflection on a splendid educational institution, by an enthusiastic recommendation that Dr. Kerr be named as chancellor.

THE O. & C. LAND GRANT

Salem, Oregon, May 18, 1932

To the Editor:— There appeared advertisements in the Oregon press for the first time yesterday in behalf of James W. Mott, self-styled "Leading Republican Candidate" for Congress, which contains statements that are deliberate falsehoods and which the late President Roosevelt was pleased to style "truth inverted."

These "paid advertisements," printed over the name of W. J. Bishop, who appears by the local directory to be a hop merchant and who presumably has no personal knowledge of the facts in the matter, were circulated at the last minute of the campaign well-knowing that Representative Hawley was at his post of duty at Washington and could not possibly see and refute the misrepresentations and lies before the election.

Your sense of fair play prompts me to appeal to you for a presentation of the facts in this matter to the electorate, if possible, be-

fore the primaries. Fortunately, there is a man close at hand who was in Washington at the time the Hawley bill for the refund of taxes to the seventeen Oregon counties arising out of the forfeited Oregon and California Railroad lands was enacted. Honorable Claude E. Ingalls, publisher of the Corvallis Gazette-Times, reputed for his honesty and ability, confirms this statement of the facts in the case, and will express himself in his own way in his paper of today, to which your attention is also called.

Senator Robert N. Stanfield was active in the support of this legislation and there is no attempt in this article in statement of fact to deprive him of any credit to which he is justly entitled. He introduced legislation similar to the Hawley bill in the Senate, but his bill was adversely reported upon by the Secretary of the Interior and did not become a law. Representative Hawley is deliberate and careful at all times and carefully prepares the way for legislation of the importance of this measure. He had as his colleague in the House from Oregon at the time the late Nicholas J. Sinnott, who was then chairman of the Committee on Public Lands of the House. There was the finest cooperation at all times between Representative Hawley and Sinnott on matters affecting the interests of Oregon, and particularly so in this instance. Knowing the opposition of the administration to the Stanford measure, Representatives Hawley and Sinnott first set about to overcome that opposition knowing that a veto of the measure by President Coolidge, should it pass Congress, would undoubtedly mean its death, as it could not be passed over a veto.

Accordingly conferences were held with the president and his cabinet advisers by Representatives Hawley, Sinnott and others, and the opposition there silenced or modified. Mr. Hawley introduced the bill, it was referred to Representative Sinnott's Committee on Public Lands. Mr. Hawley and Mr. Sinnott, with Oregon citizens interested in the legislation, immediately contacted members of the house to secure support of the measure when it came to a vote there. Mr. Sinnott had the matter favorably reported by his committee to the House and as chairman of the committee valiantly supported his report on the floor of the House and with Mr. Hawley secured sufficient support to pass it by the House and send it to the Senate where it was substituted for the Stanford measure, passed the Senate, and became a law by the approval of President Coolidge.

This "Leading Republican Candidate" for Congress, who by the way was defeated for this same position by Mr. Hawley in 1928 by the unprecedented vote of almost

30,000, had no connection whatever with this legislation, and no connection with the republican party when the O. & C. lands were forfeited as a result of the joint resolution of Fulton and Mr. Hawley, and his supporters should not tell falsehoods to connect him therewith.

Dear Sir:

In these days when all hearts are saddened by the murder of the Lindbergh baby would it not be wise for us all individually to search our own hearts and be sure that we are free from all blood-guiltiness? Would it not be wise to lay our hearts open before God and with faith ask Him to show us ourselves as we really are? I am almost certain that if we should honestly do so our first prayer would be: "God be merciful to me, a sinner." I am convinced that God would give most of us such a revelation of our own hearts that the sins of the Lindbergh baby murderers would grow pale before our eyes.

It is true that most of us have not violently killed babies in order to obtain a few thousand dollars, but have we not allowed babies to suffer and die by slow starvation or by other agonies that we might board up a few thousand to be used in obtaining futures for ourselves? Are we quite sure that in the judgment day we shall be acquitted of actual murders which we perhaps more cruel even than the Lindbergh murder?

Now, I suggest that instead of putting forth such tremendous effort to find one or two wretched

criminals we ask the President to appoint a day of humiliation and prayer and that each of us humble ourselves before God, repent and confess our sins. Then we might ask in faith that the kidnappers might be found and put in a place where they would not be a menace to other folks, and also that they might truly repent and be forgiven.

I believe this is what Jesus would want us to do and we have tried the other way long enough. We made poor Edward Hickman pay the last farthing though he was so insane that no honest or kind human being felt anything but pity for him.

Did the horrors of his death which was unusually dreadful cause any decrease in crime? I do not believe that it did? Will another brutal killing make the world any better? I do not think so. The remedy that God has always given for such conditions as we have at present was repentance and confession of sin. Would it not be better to try His plan.
