candidate issues a formal release or until it is obvious another is to be nominated and unanimity is sought.

The Oregon electorate, however, did not become greatly excited over the presidential campaign, but interest was concentrated, as far as the national ticket was concerned, mainly on the position of United States senator, the post now held by Frederick Steiwer, republican. Here the wet-dry question appeared dominant, with the power issue next in importance.

Both Steiwer and Col. Alfred E. Clark, one of his opponents, have been endorsed by the anti-alcohol league. Both are drys although each has expressed willingness that the liquor question be submitted to the people. Other candidates in the republican field are Kenneth G. Harlan, dry, and Robert Gordon Duncan and Senator Robert N. Stanfield, both wets. Duncan recently served a federal jail term for using profane language over a radio station, and Harlan is under indictment for alleged bribery in connection with a municipal market deal here.

The democratic lineup against Senator Steiwer consisted of Marshall N. Dana, associate editor of the Oregon Journal, and Elton Watkins, both drys who admit the propriety of a referendum, and Walter B. Gleason, described as a "wringing wet."

The veteran Congressman Willis C. Hawley was again up for nomination, as was Congressman Robert R. Butler, General Charles A. Martin, democratic congressman from the Multnomah county sector, was unopposed for the nomination.

In Portland the proposed recall of Mayor George L. Baker and City Commissioners M. M. Mann, alleged negligence and inefficiency in office, drew the widest attention, as did the proposed \$1,000,000 bond issue for unemployment relief.

South Silvertown will vote in the Evergreen school house and the vote is cared for with but one board composed of Arch Geer, chairman; John E. Davenport, second judge; Frank Riches, P. Neuwanger and Charles Meyers, clerk.

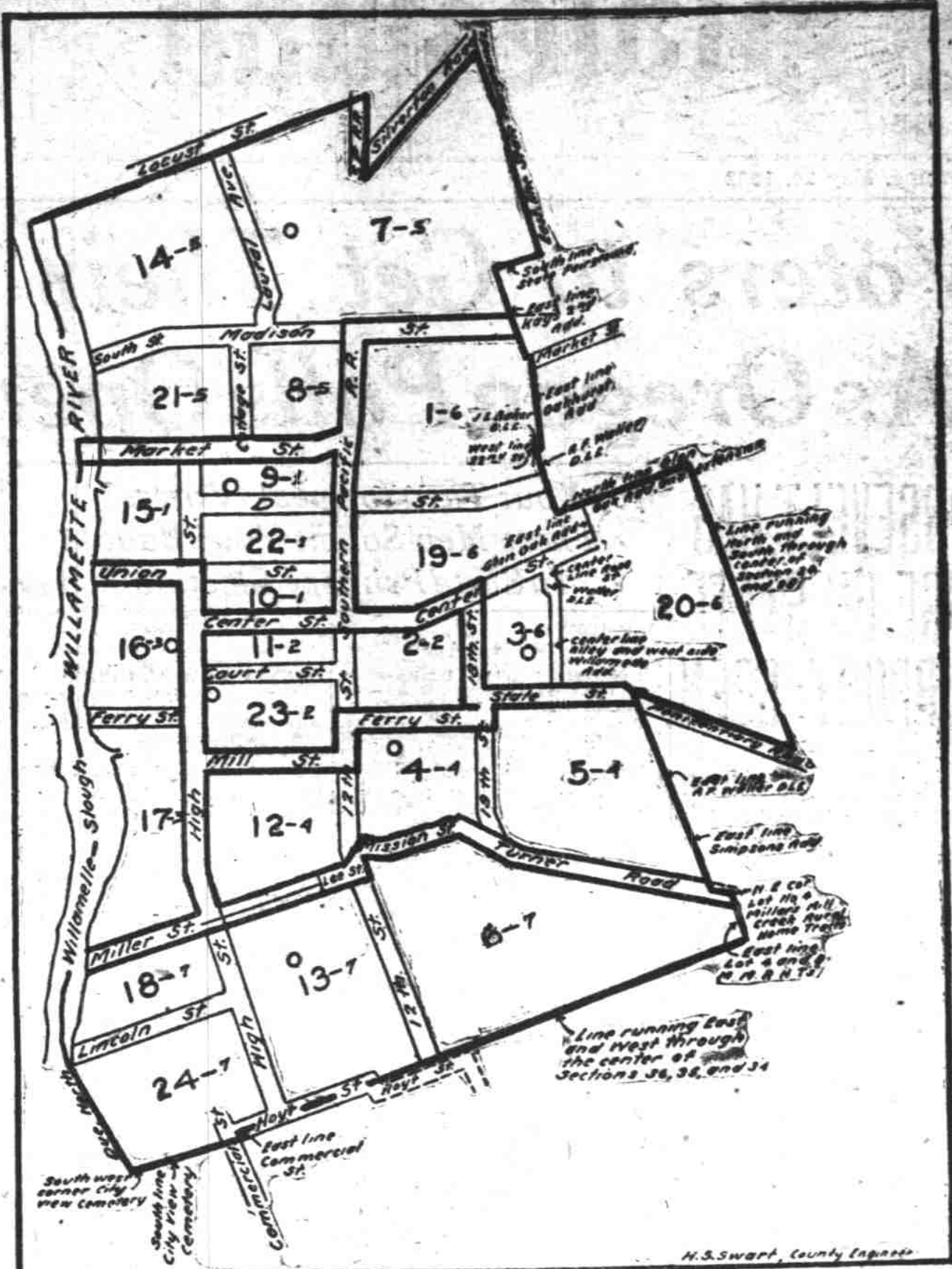

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TEACHING METHODS GIVEN RECOGNITION

Nation-wide recognition for original instruction methods has come to two Salem grade teachers.

Mrs. Bernice Skeen, principal and sixth grade teacher, and Grace M. Hendrickson, primary teacher of Park school. Teaching projects devised and used by the two instructors have been printed in separate booklets, numbers 37 and 40 of the Teachers' Lesson Unit series, bureau of publications, Columbia university, New York, teachers' college.

"Travel on Land, on Sea and in the Air," 19 pages, is Mrs. Skeen's booklet. This project, according to the author's statement, was used to give a geographical and historical background of transportation, enlarge children's reading, speaking and writing vocabularies, develop cooperation, encourage initiative and self-expression, develop leaders and followers, and to improve children's use of reference books and the dictionary.

"This transportation project in the upper grades proved very interesting and profitable," she writes. Under the three divisions, she directed her pupils in studying the development of transportation from its primitive form to that of the present.

Mrs. Hendrickson's project is entitled "Raggedy Ann and Andy," based on the children's stories by John B. Gruelle. By interesting beginning pupils in the two dolls, she guided them in learning the words and sentences with which to describe the toys. The project grew as the children learned, with, for example, the construction of a house for the dolls, acquisition of a rag dog, installation of a store, with consequent buying and selling.

Using the dolls as a means of attracting the pupils' interest, Mrs. Hendrickson, according to her booklet, led them to learn the essential subjects taught children of their age and to acquire, as well, knowledge of the basic day-by-day activities of their elders.

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
