The closest and most surprising race of the state and national ticket in this county, developed between Rufus C. Holman and Milton Scherping of Portland, both seeking the republican nomination as state treasurer.

Scherping was ahead with 40 per cent of the vote in. His total was 2428 while Holman was just a nose behind with a total of 2394. Scherping took a lead in Salem as the early returns came in. His totals were cut down by the country votes.

For attorney-general, I. H. Van Winkle appeared at midnight to be a two to one victor over Earl Bronaugh, Jr. Van Winkle in 29 incomplete precincts had 3202 votes to Bronaugh's 1475.

Charles Spaulding, without opposition in his race for the state senate, had 3384 ballots cast for him.

It found that \$23,000,000 largely contributed by the investing public had been paid for a company with a total investment of \$1,750,000 and discovered additional evidence that publicity was used to entice the small investor into manipulated stocks.

WASHINGTON, May 20—(AP)—The equalization fee and export debenture plan emerged from retirement today and returned to the senate with a farm relief youngster—the allotment plan.

LOS ANGELES, May 20—(AP)—An airplane stunt to salute the wife of one of the reformers, resulted in tragic death before the wife's eyes and those of several hundred other persons today in a residential district here.

Roy Smith, pilot, and A. A. Pehrson, secretary of the Cyclotron company, were hurled to death as the wing of their small ship collapsed in a sensational power dive over Pehrson's home.

Into a closely built bungalow section at Jefferson and third avenues, the crippled ship plunged, demolishing a private garage as it craked to splinters in the rear of a home. Smith and Pehrson had rented the plane.

RECALL ATTACK ON BAKER IS FAILURE PORTLAND, Ore., May 20—(AP)—Votes against the recall of Mayor George L. Baker late tonight outnumbered those favoring the recall by about 1400.

Retarars from 259 precincts were: Yes, 11,866; No, 12,997. Returns from 248 precincts in the recall against Commissioner John M. Mann were: Yes, 15,388; No, 8,511.

Both Baker and Mann were accused of negligence and inefficiency.

ELMA BANK ROBBED OF \$5000 BY PAIR

ELMA, Wash., May 20—(AP)—The last trace tonight of two holdup men who robbed the First National bank of Elma today of more than \$5,000 in currency and securities was their automobile, abandoned two miles east of here.

Entering shortly after the bank opened, the pair forced Claude Calavan, cashier, to open the vault. Threatened by a revolver, Calavan and two women who were in the bank were forced to lie on the floor in the rear while the place was looted. Between \$5,880 and \$6,908 in currency and securities were taken.

Heavily armed posess who returned tonight from the Matlock district, where the abandoned car was found, said the two men had transferred there to another machine. The tire tracks, they said, indicated it was a heavy car.

The abandoned automobile bore stolen Oregon license plates. The currency taken, bank officials said, was of the denominations of \$20 and less and most of the securities are not negotiable.

AIR STUNT CAUSES DEATHS OF 2 MEN

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KREUGER HAD HUGE DEBTS, CLAIM NOW

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, May 20—(AP)—A Swedish investigating committee today revealed Ivar Kreuger had \$168,300,000 in personal debts and indirect liability against his name when he fired a bullet into his brain in Paris March 12.

Pointing also to "deliberate falsification" of the books of Kreuger & Toll, the match king's main company, over a period of at least eight years, the committee recommended bankruptcy.

"There will be little, if anything secured creditors," the report concluded.

The committee laid gigantic fraud to the manipulations of this man, who until the first of the year was regarded as a powerful financial genius.

Fictitious assets for large sums were created on the Kreuger and Toll books since 1924, the report said. It recommended the Swedish government recall the existing mortgages and thereupon take the necessary steps to have the company declared bankrupt.

JUDGE CANDIDATES FAIL OF MAJORITY

No candidate for nomination and election as supreme court judge had received a majority of Marion county votes, it appeared certain early this morning on a complete return from 30 of the 79 precincts in the county.

Henry J. Bean, incumbent, was ahead in his race for department two having 1427 votes out of 30 precincts complete. Dean Roy R. Hewitt of Willamette university was running second with 1120 votes to his credit. Third in the district was John W. McCulloch with 619 votes, while James T. Brand was fourth with 495 votes.

In the race for the third position on the supreme bench, George Brown was leading the field with a total of 1439 votes out of 30 precincts complete. Second was J. O. Bailey of Portland with a total of 1312 votes. Third place was held by Loyal Graham of Forest Grove who had polled 587 votes out of 20 precincts complete.
