150 Acres Beans Nearly in At Irrigation Area of West Stayton

WEST STAYTON, May 21 — Work is progressing rapidly on the irrigation ditches, new dams and flumes being put in where the old ones were completely gone.

The rains was greatly appreciated by all the growers. Many hundreds of tomato plants have been planted in the fields in the last few days. Most of the 150 acres of Kentucky Wonder beans are planted and acres of corn.
