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CALDWELL TO TALK AT CREDIT SESSION

Field Secretary, National Association to Come Here Wednesday

Business conditions and problems, particularly as they relate to the retail credit merchant, will be discussed by Frank T. Caldwell of Miami, Florida, field secretary of the National Retail Credit association, at a dinner meeting here Wednesday night, sponsored by the Salem Retail Credit association. The dinner will be held at the Gray Belle, at 6:30 o'clock.

Business men from Dallas, McMinville, Silverton and Woodburn have indicated they will come here to hear this national authority speak on business conditions, and wives, husbands and friends of the local association members are also invited.

Mr. Caldwell was the first field secretary of the national credit group, and through his work there the national body recognized the need of a special department embracing this type of work and so divided the country into districts. At his own request, Caldwell has served the southern district.

Upon return from France, where he served during the World war with the French Foreign Legion, Caldwell entered the credit department of the National City Bank of New York, where he remained for four years, resigning to enter the agents' department of the federal reserve bank at Philadelphia, where he specialized in statistics and research. In 1925 he went to Florida, where he organized the Lee Credit association, which activity he directed until 1929 when he was induced to become a representative of the national group.

His work now is directed largely toward standardization of retail credit systems.

FORMER RESIDENT OF AUBURN CALLED

Will H. Sneed, 58, former resident of the Auburn district east of Salem, died suddenly at his home near Carlton, Yamhill county, about 9:00 o'clock Friday night, according to word received by friends in Salem. Sneed became ill at the dinner table, dying three hours later.
