Walter Fuhrer and Frank Marshall will run in the November election in ward two, Fuhrer receiving 305 votes Friday to 372 for Marshall. A. C. Page with 154 votes was eliminated.

Third, Fourth Wards To See Changes

In the sixth ward, W. H. Dancy, alderman for 12 years, was defeated soundly by Earl Daue, groceryman, who piled up 344 votes to 201 for Dancy.

Boatwright and Henderson were elected councilmen from ward four to succeed George Everett and W. D. Evans, incumbents. The count stood: Boatwright 532; Henderson 392; Evans 380; Everett 317.

Former Mayor Albin won the election as councilman for the first ward over Bradford, 559 to 559.

In the sixth ward a runoff will be necessitated between Carl Armbrist and Chris Kowitz, incumbent. Ralph Kietzing and Henry Morris were eliminated in the vote Friday. The count: Kowitz 408; Armbrist 370; Morris 230; Kietzing 225.

A general election test next November will be necessary to determine the aldermanic winner in ward seven where H. C. Leavenworth ran slightly ahead of Paul Hendricks on Friday. E. H. Kennedy was eliminated. The count: Leavenworth 396; Hendricks 425; Kennedy 164.

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will be, the crop would still be too large. The pack of Etterburgs will probably be shorter than usual in the local canneries, despite the fact that most of this variety is carried over in plants here.

Comparatively few of the Etterburgs are under contract, which means buying will be largely in the open market. So far, canners have made no move to buy, and probably will wait until the last minute, as buying will be a simple matter under present conditions.

No price has been set on any berries, but some have been bought at other canneries in the county at around two cents, it is reported.

Loganberries, on which there are few outstanding contracts, will be in better shape than strawberries from the selling standpoint, however the five cent price paid last year will not be reached, canners indicate. No price talk has been heard, however there is a big holder of the heavy pack made last spring.

The cherry crop, packing of which overlaps the berry activity, gives promise of being about the same, or possibly slightly lower than last year. Again, no price talk prevails, but canners indicate that the entire crop, particularly of Royal Anna, will sell, though not at a high figure. Three cents was paid for Royal Anna last year.

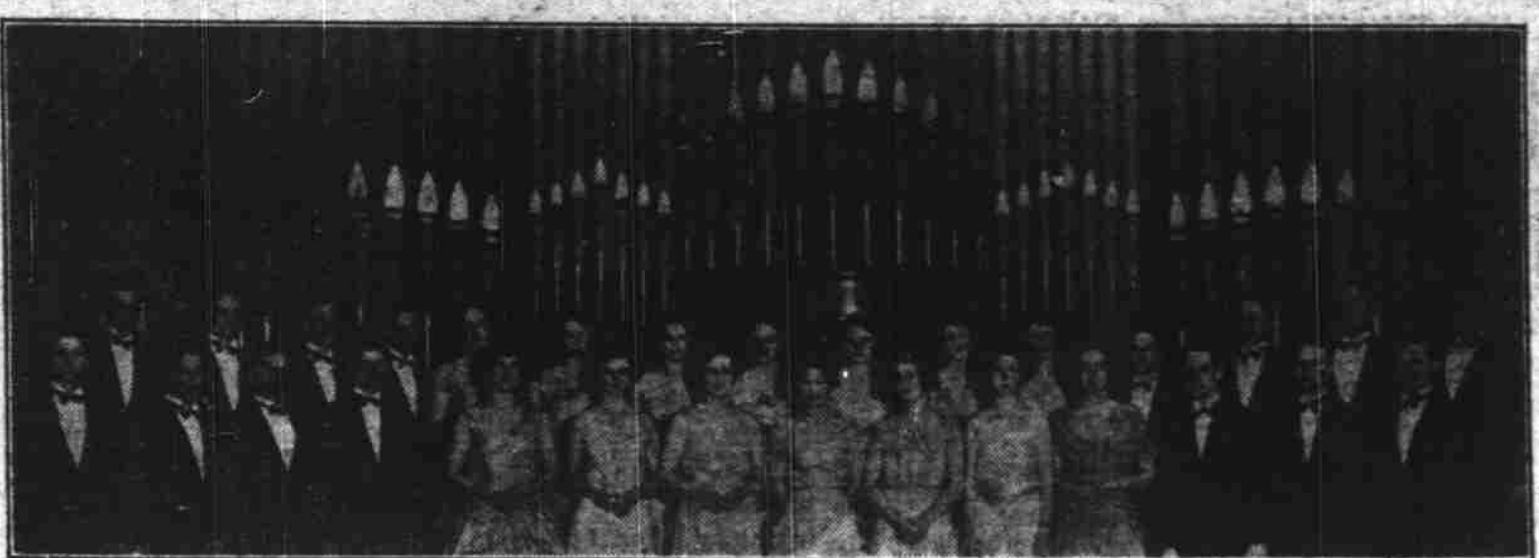

ROUTE OF CHOIR'S TOUR MAPPED OUT

Willamette's Philharmonic Group Will Visit Four States, Proposed

A tentative route for the summer tour of the Willamette university Philharmonic choir and stringed quartet has been mapped out and includes stops in four states with a possibility that it will be extended even farther toward the east.

Professor Cameron Marshall, head of the Willamette music department, has been boosting the tour as an advertising means for Salem and Willamette. Salem merchants are underwriting the tour, but part of the expense money will be obtained from the gate receipts on the way.

June 21 has been set as the date of departure from Salem on the tour, which will be largest of its kind ever undertaken here.

The group of 28 voices, Professor Cameron Marshall, Robert Magin, accompanist, and a lady chaperone, will leave together in a bus and head northward. The principal towns on the tentative route are Portland, Kelso, Centralia, Olympia, Everett, Wenatchee, Yakima, Colfax and Spokane, Butte, Mont., Livingston, Idaho Falls, Pocatello and Boise in Idaho, with Baker, LaGrande, Pendleton, Bend, Klamath Falls, Ashland and Roseburg on the final bend of the journey.

Other stops may be added on the way, but at present the indications are that the tour will last three or four weeks.

The Philharmonic choir consists of 14 women and 14 men's voices, selected from the larger glee clubs. The personnel of the choir is not fully decided as yet because some of the students have not completed arrangements to go. In most cases, however, there has been little or no trouble in making such arrangements.

Appearance on the route will be made through the cooperation of churches and civic organizations. Advance material is being sent out to all the towns of consequence on the route. Answers from these correspondences will soon be coming in and some appearances have been practically arranged already.

In years past the Willamette women have taken an annual tour to either the north or to the south and the Willamette men have gone in the opposite directions. This year for the first time the two clubs were combined into the Philharmonic choir and traveled together for a brief tour of the Columbia river section.

So splendid was the response to the appearances that Professor Marshall, immediately on his return to Salem from the tour, formulated plans for this summer's tour and outlined them before the executive council of the university.

The program is varied, having some popular numbers and some sacred music, as well as the infallible negro spiritual numbers. The women's Treble Cleft club and the men's glee club will have some separate numbers to present in addition to the chorus work.

The stringed quartet will be an added attraction, being composed of members of the men's glee club. Though only in its first year of existence, the quartet has made numerous appearances both with the glee club and elsewhere.

TAX RELIEF BILLS FILED AT CAPITOL

Preliminary petitions for a proposed constitutional amendment and two initiative measures sponsored by the Oregon Taxpayers Equalization and Conservation league, were filed in the offices of the secretary of state here yesterday.

The constitutional amendment and one initiative measure provide for the appointment of tax conservation commissions in each county in the state, with authority to review all tax levies and bond issues within the respective counties. The commissions would be composed of three non-salaried members, who would be appointed by the voters.

The second initiative measure would amend the existing state income tax law through the reduction of exemptions and increase of the tax rate.

The law provides that the completed petitions shall be filed in the state department and shall contain approximately 15,500 signatures of voters.

The petitions were filed by J. M. Bardette of McMinnville, president of the tax league.

RELIEF BOND ISSUE MEASURES CARRIED

PORTLAND, Ore., May 21. (AP) — Portland yesterday voted to retain George L. Baker as mayor or but recalled John M. Mann, city commissioner.

Complete returns from 478 precincts out of 495 tonight gave the following vote on the recall: Baker: yes, 38,721; no, 41,925. Mann: yes, 50,176; no, 27,008. The two city officials were accused of negligence and inefficiency.

The city and Multnomah county (Portland) approved bond measures totaling \$2,400,000 for unemployment relief. The county and the city were authorized to issue each \$1,000,000 in bonds for that purpose and the city was authorized to issue an additional \$400,000 to purchase necessities for direct relief of indigent families.

Some action probably will be urged at the next legislative session looking to the control of oil and gasoline trucks operating on the state highways. This was announced by R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer.

Baldock said two gasoline trucks had overturned and burned during the past few months with considerable damage to the pavement. In each case the operators were assessed the amount of the damage.

Baldock said the situation might prove serious in case one of these trucks was to catch on fire while crossing a wooden bridge.

REALLY MOVEMENT IS SHOWING GAINS

Marked improvement has been noticeable in the real estate business during the last six months, according to H. C. Shields, local realty agent. Business also compares favorably with that of the past to years, he says.

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MELSON KEEPS LEAD TO LAST

Paulus, Martin, Abrams and Goulet in Legislative Race are Winners

Melson had been nominated and therefore elected as county commissioner succeeding John Porter. For county representative the 79 precincts had given Otto K. Paulus the highest vote, closely followed by Mrs. Hannah Martin and Carl Abrams. Romeo Goulet, only member of the 1930 delegation to seek reelection, came fourth with 509 votes less than Abrams.

For coroner the voters had unseated Lloyd Rigdon, incumbent for two terms, and given a substantial majority to L. E. Barrick.

As preferential candidate for the republican nomination at Chicago the county had given 6085 votes to Joseph France of Maryland to 1700 votes for Herbert Hoover, incumbent, whose name had to be written upon the ballot. In all other county and state races, Marion county had preferred the incumbents to the aspirants for their offices.

Mott polled a heavy vote over Hawley, runner-up, the state corporation commissioner receiving a total of 6311 votes to Hawley's 3663. Mott's lead was sustained in almost all of the 79 precincts. Hulet ran a poor third with 1381 votes and Emmett Howard of Eugene was far behind with a total of 548 votes.

The county gave its plurality to Frederick W. Stelwer for the republican nomination as senator but Robert N. Stanfield, one-time senator, ran closely behind Stelwer's 4264 total with 3577 votes to his credit. Alfred E. Clark, the Meier-endorsed candidate, was third with 3059 votes. Kenneth Harlan and "Wildcat" Duncan of Portland drew less than a thousand votes for their combined ballot total.

Milton Scherping, a Portland youngster running against Rufus C. Holman for the republican nomination as state treasurer, developed a surprising strength, leading in the county as the early returns came in and holding a 4990 votes to 6108 for Holman when the total was recorded.

Hal E. Hoss ran a stronger race for re-nomination as secretary of state on the republican ticket. Hoss had a total vote of 7930 in the county to 3542 for George Palmer, who was sponsored by

the grange and the tax reductionist-leaders.

For district attorney William H. Trindle was winner, defeating by 463 votes Allen G. Carson. Trindle had the support of the so-called "dry" vote and was allied with the McMahon faction in county politics.

Roy Melson, a Salem business man, ran first for county commissioner, H. M. King of Victor Point coming next with 2721 to Melson's 2950. W. A. Hoeter ran third with 2342 votes and John Porter fourth with a total of 1997. Last man was Ed A. Jory, tax league member, with 1925 votes.

Oscar A. Bower won a substantial plurality for county sheriff against Charles L. Ratcliff, runner-up. Bower's total was 5310 while Ratcliff got 3995. Joe Williams was far behind as third and Goulet polled only 1041 votes.

Oscar Steelhammer won a majority vote over two opponents for county assessor. Mrs. Mildred Brooks Robertson was a two-to-one victor over F. Howard Zinser, and Barrick, running hard against Rigdon, defeated the latter by nearly 2000 votes.

race with Hawley in 1930 had stamped him in the minds of most observers as the sure-enough nominee this spring. Delzell's disappointment yesterday was augmented by Hawley's probable defeat, as Delzell wanted to make his race against Hawley rather than Mott. His position, if he does defeat Starkweather, will be far less favorable than if he could have used Hawley's conservative, tariff, anti-bonus record as campaign material.

Alfred E. Clark, endorsed by Governor Julius L. Meier at the suggestion of Henry Mahzen, his political arbiter, ran a poor third in the county and his position was relatively the same in the state. Robert Stanfield's second place in the county was directly the result of the "dry" support here, the Hopgrowers' league using every effort to place a man on the general election ballot this fall who was not a middle-grinder like Stelwer and not a dry like Clark.
