

SALES TALK IS ARGUED AGAIN

Jay Stockman Defense Asks This Evidence be not Given to Jurors

agents of the Empire Holding corporation. Prosecutor Goldstein repeated his arguments as given in the two previous cases and plans to present more of these tomorrow morning.

George Robison, first president of the Empire Holding corporation, was the first witness called by the state. He repeated his story of the formation of the concern as he did in the previous trials and told of the sales methods he used during his services as a salesman. Robison told of his selection as president in the office of Jay Stockman October 15, 1930 and also stated that Stockman had attended all the directors' meetings that the witness had attended. He said that, when the corporation commission was planning on suspending the permit to sell stock, he had suggested that Stockman's salary contract be cancelled but that this was never done.

Under cross-examination by the defense, Robison said that Frank Keller, Jr. had said that there was an opening in the corporation for an attorney and that Stockman was secured for this position. He said that he may have signed some of the records, while he was president, without reading them. He also stated that Stockman was to be paid for his legal services but was not sure how this was to be done.

Robison stated that he had acted in good faith in all his dealings with the Empire concern and that he did not knowingly make any misrepresentations to anyone.

Miss Minifred Graham of Salem was called to identify the application for a permit to sell stock. She stated that she had witnessed the signatures on this document as a notary public on November 14, 1930 in Judge O. P. Coshaw's office in Salem. This application was signed by Judge Coshaw, Frank Keller, Jr., Jay Stockman, W. R. Adams and I. H. Fetty.

Fred J. Meindl, former examiner for the state corporation commission, identified the application for the permit to sell Empire stock and told of the examination of the concern and its officers made by him prior to the granting of the permit. Under cross-examination, Meindl stated that he had written for more information about the concern and had asked for a balance sheet. He said that he had never seen this balance sheet but that one might have been submitted after he made his report.

During Meindl's testimony, Rice objected to the introduction of certain papers as evidence as these were not all that were included in the application. After some arguing on both sides all the exhibits which were given to Meindl with the application were entered as evidence.

Meindl was hazy about the contracts which were in existence at the time he made his investigation but stated later that he did not learn of the contracts, other than those with Frank and C. J. Keller, until after the permit to sell stock had been granted.

Charles Goodwin, auditor with the state corporation commission, was called and identified the list of salesmen who were registered to sell Empire stock. He stated that there were 123 registered salesmen in this concern.

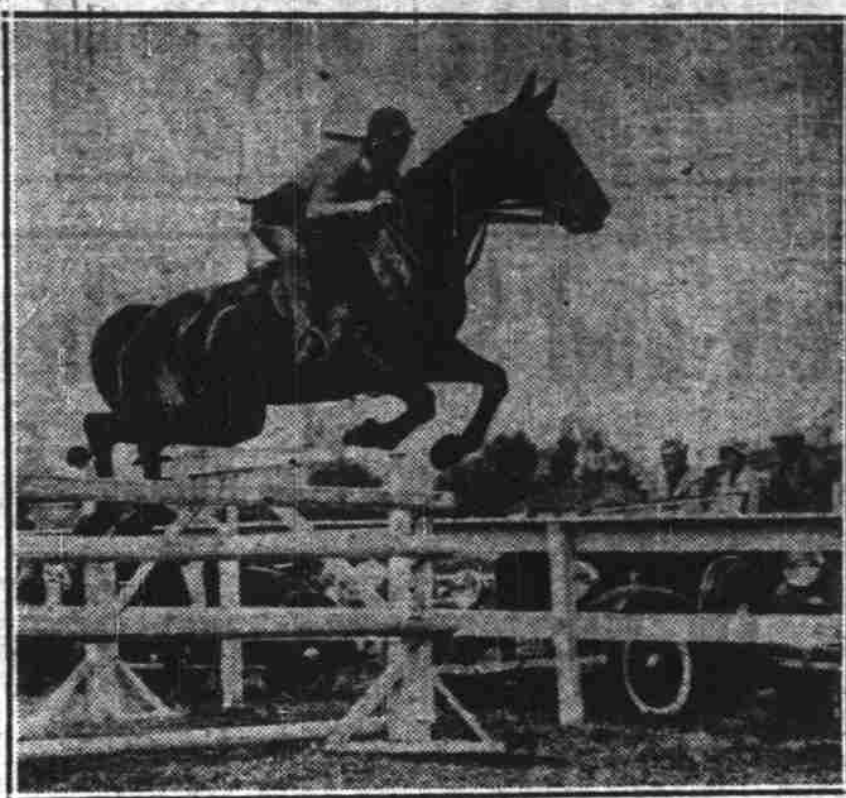
the next two months. The convention commission has been meeting weekly for the past seven months, he said.

come fully up to the 75,000 mark, he said. "This section of the country is holding greater interest than any other area today," he declared and pointed to the invaluable drawing card the Legion convention is proving to be.

Robert Mount of the Portland better business bureau told how the commission is making every effort to handle the concession end of the convention impartially and at the same time to afford a maximum of protection to the public. Phil Jackson of the Oregon Journal, in charge of the financial end of the convention, said a greater pre-convention interest than ever before is evident, and urged advance registration of ex-service men.

"Make these visitors feel welcome, and they'll come back," Carl R. Moser, state adjutant, said in urging that all residents join in making the convention a success from this standpoint. Major General George A. White of Salem spoke of details for the convention parade, in which more than 30,000 Legionnaires and auxiliary members will march.

POWER PLANTS ARE VISITED ON SUNDAY

Large Party of Lions and Their Families Make Clackamas Jaunt

Rain failed to quench the enthusiasm of the 40 Lions and members of their family for the trip they took Sunday to view the Portland General Electric company's giant Oak Grove power project on the Clackamas river above Estacada. The jaunt by speeder up the 39 miles of mountain railroad wound along the sides of the river gorge and afforded a rare panorama of woodland and cliff scenery.

The party left Faraday, near Estacada, on the speeder at 9:30 in the morning and arrived at the head of the project, 30 miles upstream, at 12:30. The intake camp where dinner was served in the company cook shack is approximately due east of Gervais.

Following the dinner hour, W. M. Hamilton, manager of the power company's Salem district, who was host for the trip, described the Oak Grove project. First surveys were made in 1907. Construction was begun in 1921 and the first unit, Three Links, at an expenditure of \$2,000,000, was completed in 1924. This unit, consists of a six-mile line of nine-foot pipe, which empties with a nearly vertical 900-foot fall into the water turbine power house. It is capable of generating 60,000 kilowatts. This power is transmitted at 57,000 volts potential over the lines to the River Mill plant below Estacada.

The project is planned for eventual construction of seven power units. A four-mile tunnel to bring in water from another fork of the river, tripling the output of the Three Links plant, is under construction, with the bore driven 3600 feet under the mountain. Work on it has been temporarily halted. Final cost of the project will be \$20,000,000.

In addition to the river and mountain scenery, the Lions party also got close up glimpses of wild life. Deer were seen from the speeder, a few feet above the grade. On the return trip, the Lions saw a bear which had been killed on the tracks that morning.

All members of the party reported that the trip surpassed their expectations. Rain fell lightly during portions of the speeder journey.

This trip takes the place of the club's Thursday luncheon this week.

Home Owner to Get Architect Services Free

Opportunity for some home owner to have his house remodeled with architectural service free was offered last night at a meeting of the Salem chapter, Oregon Building congress, board of directors, in the United States National bank building. Others of the directors indicated that they too might offer their services.

The reason for the offer is that the builders desire to have a remodeled house here to show as an example of what may be done in the way of modernizing an old dwelling.

Oregon Officers Not to Receive Hickman Reward

SAN FRANCISCO, May 23.—(AP)—The \$10,000 offered by the city of Los Angeles in 1927 for the arrest of William Edward Hickman, child slayer, was held illegal by the United States circuit court of appeals here today.

The reward was sought by T. B. Gurdane and C. R. Llewellyn, Penitentiary, Ore., officers, and their claim had been upheld by the Los Angeles federal district court. In reversing the lower court's decision, the court of appeals held the municipality was without authority to offer rewards for apprehension of criminals.

Hawley in the lead. Then Clatsop county had a check of totals and Mott went back into the lead with slightly more than 200 votes.

Here the count stayed in the early afternoon hours, Portland papers again headlining Mott's victory. Then a check in Marion county swung the tide back to Hawley and missing precincts in Curry county when reported, augmented Hawley's lead.

By 6 p. m. news of a check in Lincoln had come in and a gain for Mott had been recorded with the result that the corporation commissioner was less than 100 votes ahead.

Under the law, the entire vote is first canvassed in each county and the county reports are then sent to the secretary of state. The official count will be added before the results can be positively determined.

An actual recount of ballots is seldom had. Under the law the person or persons demanding such a recount must pay for the cost or post bond that it will be paid for, unless there has been evidence of fraud. Oftentimes discrepancies develop, however, in the final tabulations, between the report of the county clerks and the check of tally sheets by the secretary of state's office.

When Judge Benson and Charles L. McNary were opponents many years ago, Benson won by one vote in the final recount. McNary refused to ask for a new count.
