HIMMEL IN HOSPITAL

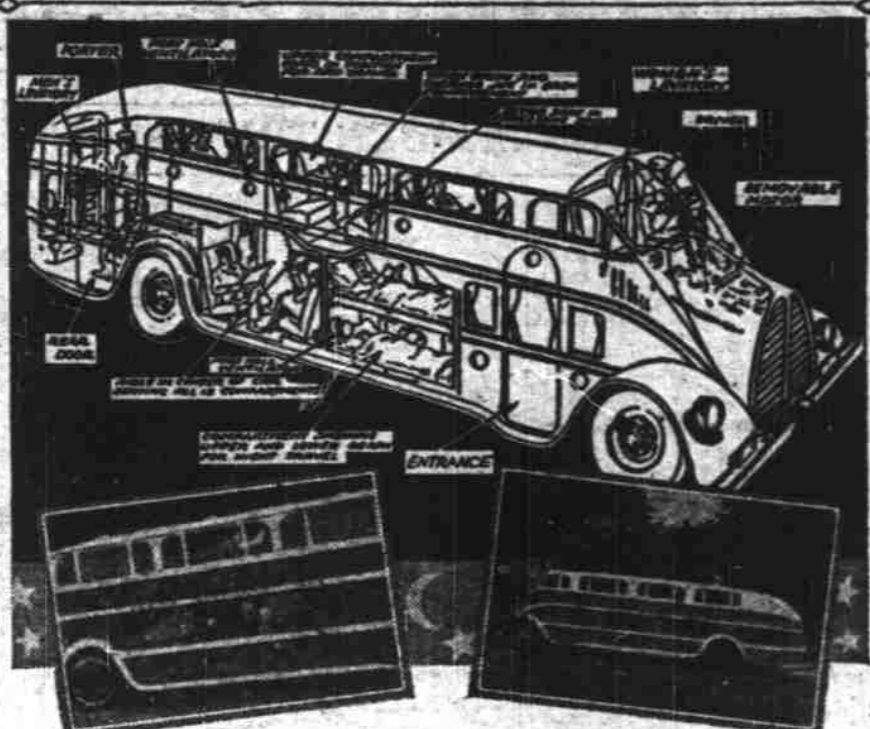

NITECOACH VISITS HERE FIRST TIME

One of the new Pacific Greyhound Nitecoaches which will operate between Portland and San Francisco stopped here yesterday. It was on an exhibition trip through the northwest. The coach is specially constructed with berths for sleeping. It will accommodate 24 passengers. It is built on two decks and the berths are upper and lower as in a railroad sleeper. The driver sits on the upper deck and has a long view ahead over the tops of cars. Each compartment has a wash basin, running water and jug of ice water. There are two lavatories.

The new service will start June 4. Herbert D. Gayford of Beaumont & Hohman, advertising agents, accompanied the nitecoach on the trip.

COST OF REPAIRING STATE AUTOS EYED

Police Cars' Upkeep is too High Says Holman; put Ridehalm on job

An investigation to determine whether the cost of repairing state owned automobiles is excessive, will be made here by the state board of control, it was determined Tuesday morning at a meeting of the board.

Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, said he had been informed that the expense of repairing state police cars alone aggregated more than \$1100 a month. W. W. Ridehalm, director of state transportation, will conduct the probe on behalf of the board of control.

Records show that approximately 100 motor vehicles are operated by the state police department.

Another meeting of the board of control will be held next Tuesday, when the proposal to construct a state-owned power plant at the Oregon state penitentiary will be given further consideration. The cost of the plant was estimated at \$150,000.

At a previous meeting of the board of control no bids were received for the construction of the plant, and it was decided to re-advertise for new proposals. Governor Meier requested that Ridehalm determine whether the state printing department is paying its printer more than is received by employees of commercial shops. He also asked for a statement showing comparative costs for job printing in the state shop and commercial plants.

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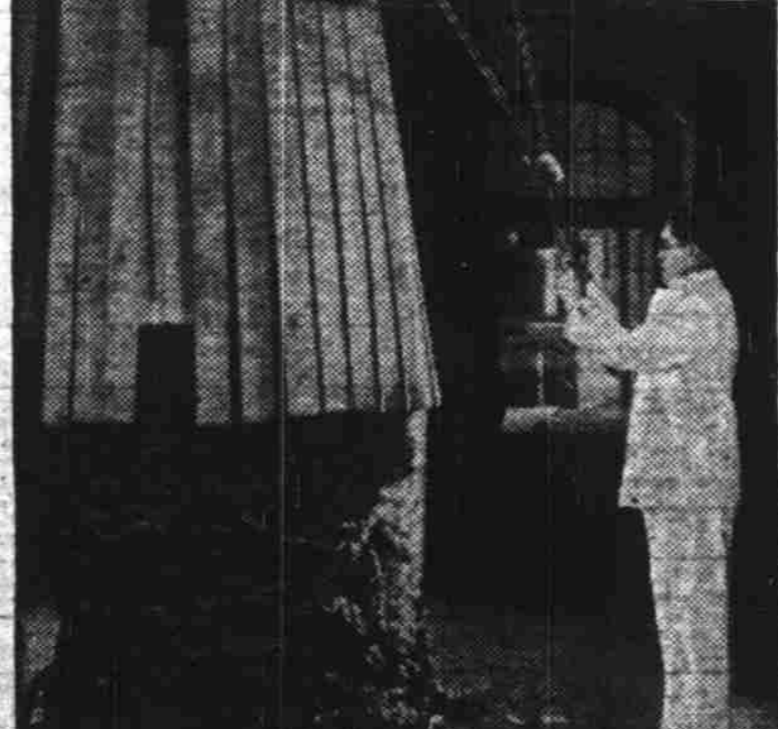

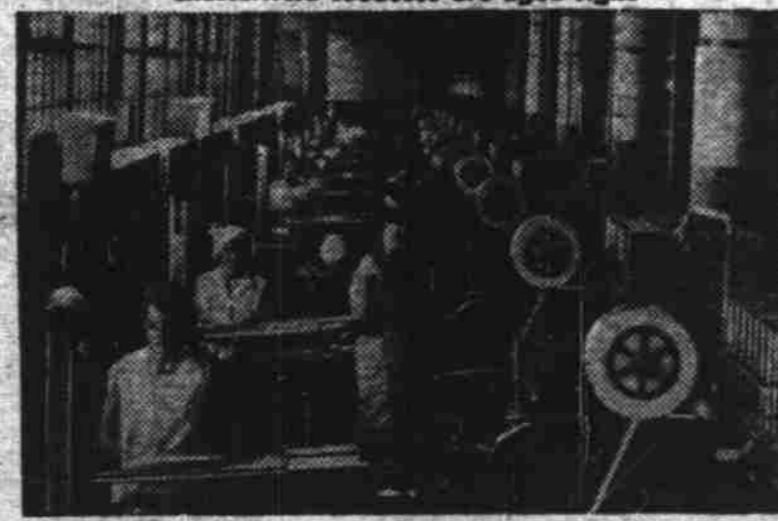
