

DEFENSE SEEKS TO BAR RECORD

Claim not identified; Will Be Ruled Upon Today; Clancy Witness

Clancy was chosen secretary in May 1931 and was to serve without a salary. He had become connected with the company with the understanding that he was to have full knowledge of what was going on. He stated that he was never permitted to be present at the meetings of the executive committee and that he had never seen the minutes of these meetings. The executive committee consisted of Judge Coshaw, Jay Stockman, I. H. Fetty and W. R. Adams.

The witness stated that he began his investigation of the corporation in the latter part of May, 1931, in order to determine the basis the others had come in on. He learned that some had paid as high as \$2000 and that the defendant in this case, Jay Stockman, had paid nothing. He took this matter up with the other officers in June and asked each what they had actually paid in the concern. Clancy contended that salaries would not be paid as the company was not operating when the question regarding the amount of money available to meet current bills was discussed and also when Clancy demanded the return of the money which he had loaned to the concern to pay outstanding obligations. He also said that there was never sufficient money on hand to qualify a subsidiary company.

Confidence in Coshaw Reason for Investing Under cross-examination by Dexter Rice, Clancy said he had some experience as a stockholder in an insurance company. He also said one reason he decided to take stock was his personal friendship with Coshaw and Adams. He was also aware of the ability of Frank Keller as an organizer of insurance companies.

Clancy identified several letters which he wrote after he learned of the salary contracts, all of which told of his confidence in the success of the corporation and that he believed it a good investment. He admitted accompanying salesmen on several trips but said that he was a "false alarm" as a salesman and had never sold a share of stock. He stated that he had absolute confidence in the future of the concern even after he learned of the salary contracts as an adjustment, but after he learned that this was not done he lost hope for the corporation.

Jacob Dobrin of Portland, told of a conversation with Stockman and Fetty. In this he was urged to become connected with the company but declined. He stated that he did not believe he would care to become connected with the concern because of the misrepresentations being made by the field forces.

Judge Walker stated this afternoon that the trial of I. H. Fetty, former vice president of the Empire Holding corporation, would begin June 14. Following the conclusion of the Stockman trial, Judge Walker plans to try the cases on the Polk county docket. The trial of Dr. W. R. Adams will follow that of Fetty.

chairs which belonged to her mother, and a Seth Thomas clock, the latter to be placed between the two front doors in the vestibule of the church.

The will states that the next of kin of Mrs. Davis is a first cousin, J. M. Sharp of Sotico, Cal., but does not mention him further.

Relative to the home for the needy, the balance of the property is to be converted into cash or notes bearing at least 5 per cent interest, this to be taken care of by trustee.

The home for the needy shall be non-sectarian and open to both sexes, and shall be erected between the tabernacle lands and the road running south, known as the Marion road. The will provides that the land upon which the building shall be erected shall front on the Aumsville-Turner pavement and shall run to the creek on the south and include not less than five acres.

In case of death or inability of Endicott to act as executor, W. W. McKinney, son of John McKinney, is to do so, the will states.

Work to be Concentrated at Eugene With Exception of Lower Division

master of business administration are offered at Eugene. A total of 12 term subjects in lower division for the first two years of work will be given on both campuses, in addition to the lower division work in secretarial training continued only at Corvallis; 54 term subjects in upper division work are offered at Eugene, as are 12 term subjects of graduate work. Fifteen upper division term subjects are retained at Corvallis for service work for graduates of other schools and to permit the 1933 class to be graduated there.

Staff Assignments Are Announced Staff assignments announced reveal that there will be 26 faculty members for the two campuses next year, three of whom are listed as on leave of absence.

On the Eugene campus will be a staff of 19, including Dean Harrison V. Breckner, professor of business administration; Katharine A. Bailey, following are the others assigned to Eugene: Dr. John H. Bond, C. Lyle Kelly, Alfred A. Lomax and Dr. N. H. Comish, professors of business administration; O. K. Burrell, Daniel D. Gage, Jr., John M. Rae, Lee C. Ball and Dr. E. B. Mittelman, all assistant professors of business administration; Clausius D. Hadley, Arthur B. Stillman and W. B. Riddleberger, assistant professors of business administration; Charles C. Howard, professor of law (one-fourth time); Carlton E. Spencer, associate professor of law (one-fourth time); Guy S. Claire, assistant professor of law (one-fourth time); Raymond W. Breckner, instructor in business administration; and W. F. G. Thacher, professor of advertising (two-thirds time).

Of these Professor Comish, Associate Professors Ball and Mittelman, and Assistant Professor Riddleberger were transferred from Corvallis to Eugene. Associate Professors Gage and Hadley will be on leaves of absence next year.

Assigned to the Corvallis campus are John A. Bexell, dean emeritus of the school of commerce; Lella Hay, secretary; E. E. Bosworth, professor of accounting; H. T. Vance, professor of business administration; J. Lloyd LeMaster, associate professor of business administration; Frank L. Robinson, associate professor of accounting; J. H. Irvine, assistant professor of accounting; Curtis Kelly, assistant professor of business administration; Minnie D. Frick, assistant professor of secretarial training; Lily N. Nordgren, instructor in secretarial training; Associate Professor Robinson will be on leave of absence the coming year.

In the readjustment three staff members at Corvallis resigned, four were transferred from Corvallis to Eugene, one regular staff member at Eugene resigned, and a staff of six assistants there was reduced to one.

Linn and Marion county courts, in session here yesterday morning, decided to use steel construction on the intercounty bridge over the Santiam at Mehama, bids for which will be advertised by the highway commission in Portland June 23.

Representatives of the West Coast Lumbermen's association and of the Arch-Rib construction company made a strong showing for timber construction.

Estimated cost of the bridge is \$9,405, to be borne jointly by the two counties. The courts decided upon steel primarily because one span of the structure was erected several years ago and of steel. This is on the Marion county side.

Engineer Ricketts of the state highway bridge engineer's department, was present, and estimated the present bridge could be kept open to traffic until July 4, after which no effort will be made to keep traffic over this route open, on account of the expense.

Members of the Linn county court present were Judge D. O. Woodworth and Commissioners H. F. Warren and H. A. Henninger.

Ballot titles for a proposed constitutional amendment and two initiative measures, sponsored by the Oregon tax equalization and conservation league, have been completed by Attorney General Van Winkle.

The proposed constitutional amendment authorizes centralized control of all tax levies, bond issues and certain other indebted-

ness. One of the initiative measures provides for the appointment of a non-salaried tax supervising and conservation board of three members for each county, to review budgets and regulate tax levies of the county and of all municipal corporations therein. Members of the boards would be appointed by the governor.

The other initiative measure provides for increasing the rate of tax under the personal income law, and reduces certain exemptions now authorized by statute.

RESULT UNCHANGED BY OFFICIAL COUNT

Douglas McKay received 1015 rather than 1054 votes more than Mayor P. M. Gregory in the race for Salem mayorality at the May 20 election, official canvass of the vote revealed yesterday. The official vote for McKay stands at 4299, 507 more than the number required to elect, and for Gregory, at 3284, an increase 39 over the unofficial count.

Official votes for other city offices were as follows: Recorder—Poulson 3353, Boshard 2654, Jones 1369, Boshard and Poulson coming up for re- vote in November; treasurer—Rice 4421, Perry 2654; water commissioner, for a four year term—Cole 3718, Doughton 4653, Gahlsdorf 5173, Rosteln 4543; the three last named elected; water commissioner, two year term—Delano 3952, Gabriel 4253, Odum 4140, the last two elected, two votes for other candidates.

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RELIEF NEED HERE IS NOT DIMINISHED

Destitute Families Remain Numerous and Salvation Army Fund is low

A pair of shoes, so worn that soles and uppers scarcely kept company, was yesterday exhibited by a local Salvation Army worker as pointed testimony of the want and poverty that prevails in some Salem homes right now.

The woman who was grateful to get someone's cast-off shoes in exchange for her poor excuses is the mother of four small children—and the cupboard in that family's house is bare of food.

The family's story is one which the Army workers hear many times a week: the husband and father is unable to get work of any kind, what funds, if any had been saved, have been exhausted. And now there must be work or charity, or both.

The husband of the woman with the decrepit shoes even sold the family cow to tide them over the workless period. Now those funds are gone, and work as far away as ever, apparently. In this particular case, the best of references are available, and anyone who has work or who can otherwise help the family of six is asked to communicate with the Salvation Army.

Food, clothing of all kinds, and even furniture are all needed and needed badly by the Army workers, whose store of supplies is exhausted by the heavy drain. Demand for aid today is fully as heavy, if not more so, than two months ago, an assistant declared yesterday.

Yesterday, six families were given aid by the Army workers, the day before five families were assisted, and one day earlier in the week eight families were given sustenance.

"We are doing what we can to keep people from starving, but with so many calls for help, we are forced to appeal to the generous people of the town for food-stuffs and clothing to carry on in the face of the continued needs," E. L. Money, assistant to the adjutant, said yesterday.

He told of a woman, wife of a painter who is anxious to get work but can find none, who actually went without food for so long that she fainted from hunger.

Cabin Blown up, Tenant is Away

HILLSBORO, Ore., May 27.—(AP)—Dynamiting of a cabin used by Jack Course, a woodcutter, on the Vandermand place near North Plains was reported today to Sheriff Connell. The blast occurred yesterday while one was in the cabin, the sheriff said after an investigation.

The cabin was reduced to kindling.
