AUMSVILLE, May 28-An atempt at robbery was started early Saturday morning at the bank in Aumsville. The bank, post office and drug store which Mrs. T. W. Johnson, a widow woman, operates and also lives in the back part of, are all in one building. Two men broke in through the back door and rushed to her bed, threw a blanket over her face, then taped her arms and feet. They asked her what was in the front part of the building and she told them but they did not enter that part at all. 


